- Y.C.C. staff recently took part in a Mental Health First Aid program and successfully passed, receiving our certificates. This training has helped us become more aware and equipped to provide support to those who may be struggling with mental health issues.
- Our staff has completed the Food Safety Training required for our FSD Partnership.
- Marty Wermers reorganizing our pantry shelves to ensure that they align perfectly with our new
  operating model. This step has helped us to streamline our processes and work more efficiently.
- I had the opportunity to attend a COAD disaster planning meeting, where the Contact Center will be playing a role as part of the basic needs action team.
- Y.C.C. participated in the United Way's back-to-school program by providing and distributing backpacks to students in need.
- Hosted a 50/50 Raffle in conjunction with Mount Marty Athletics during one of the Mount Marty Lancers Football games.
- We successfully applied for Feeding South Dakota, and as a result, we're now able to receive goods from them starting September 2023. This will enable us to contribute towards ensuring that those in need have access to food.
- We successfully applied for TEFAP, and as a result, we're now able to receive free food from them starting November 2023.
- The pantry received a visit from the Spark group during their morning coffee hour. It was a delightful experience as 30 individuals took part in the tour.
- On September 28th, we hosted an open house.

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A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CHAIRPERSON TO SIGN AN APPLICATION AND THE SOUTH EASTERN COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION FOR A GRANT FUNDING OPPORTUNITY FROM THE US DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION ENTITLED "FY 2024 NATIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENTS" FOR PLANNING FOR TRAIL CONNECTIVITY WITHIN AND BETWEEN CLAY AND YANKTON COUNTIES, SD.

**WHEREAS,** recreational trails offer opportunities for residents and visitors to engage in activities such as walking, biking, hiking, and other forms of outdoor recreation and exercise that address public health concerns such as obesity and mental health; and

**WHEREAS**, according to the Bureau of Economic Analysis the outdoor recreation economy accounted for \$454 billion of the nation's gross domestic product; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Park Service, the Missouri National Recreational River supported \$6.9 million in local spending and 90 local jobs for a total benefit of \$8.5 million; and WHEREAS, the 2015 Yankton County and 2023 Clay County Master Transportation Plans have identified connecting communities, trail segments, and recreation areas via pedestrian-oriented trails as an action to pursue; and

**WHEREAS**, outstanding natural, cultural, and recreational features enhance the quality of life for residents and create a sense of belonging and identity; and

WHEREAS, there are a number of these outstanding natural, cultural, and recreational features in or in proximity to Clay and Yankton Counties, SD including but not limited to: Missouri National Recreational River, Spirit Mound, Green Island, Goat Island, Bow Creek Recreation Area, Mulberry Bend Overlook, Clay County Park, Riverside Park, Gavins Point Recreation Area, White Crane Recreation Area, and Myron Grove that would further benefit residents and visitors of Clay and Yankton County if connected via a network of pedestrian-oriented trails; and

WHEREAS, the US Department of Transportation is offering grants that could assist Clay and Yankton Counties with feasibility studies, cost-benefit analyses, preliminary environmental reviews, and community engagement that Clay County has prepared an application for NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Clay County Board of Commissioners that the Chairperson is hereby authorized to sign an application and Southeast Council of Government is hereby authorized to submit the application for a grant funding opportunity from the US Department of Transportation entitled "FY 2024 National Infrastructure Investments" for planning for trail connectivity within and between Clay and Yankton counties, SD. ### **Project Description**

#### **Project Background**

This project proposal is a direct result of collaboration amongst partners with vested interests in southeastern South Dakota. Various agencies and partners manage natural and recreational resources along the Missouri River and have identified a lack of trail connectivity as a barrier to the area realizing its full potential. Partners who contributed to the formulation of this proposal include Planning and Development District III, South Eastern Council of Governments, Missouri National Recreational River (MNRR), and the Counties of Clay and Yankton. Each partner contributed unique perspectives and ideas. Letters of support were acquired from partners who will collaborate and contribute insight to the project's implementation if funded.

#### **Project Location and Context**




Figure 1 – Project Area

The project area is defined as Clay and Yankton Counties, SD, which are in southeastern South Dakota along the Missouri River and Nebraska border. The area is defined by its rural character. The nearest metropolitan areas are Sioux City, IA, Sioux Falls, SD, and Omaha, NE, although their distance makes their economic influence minimal. Clay County's (2020 Census population: 14,967) largest incorporated city is Vermillion (2020 Census Population: 11,695), which serves as the County Seat. It is home to the University of South Dakota. Yankton County's (2020 Census population: 23,310) largest incorporated city is Yankton (2020 Census Population: 15,411), which serves as the county seat. It is home to Mount Marty University. There are three census tracts that are areas of persistent poverty (Tracts 9657 and 9659 in Clay County and 9663.02 in Yankton County) in the project area. Census Tract 9661 in Yankton County is a historically disadvantaged community. A map of the project area is shown in Figure 1.




Figure 2 - Already existing trails





Figure 3 – Dotmocracy Mapping Activity


#### **Existing Plans**

While the area has many outstanding natural, cultural, and recreational features, it lacks a trail system that connects them. Providing such a trail network would allow for the features to function more as a cohesive unit. Already existing trails are shown in Figure 2. Desirable features and amenities expressed by those attending public discussions are shown in Figure 3. In 2015, Yankton County adopted its Master Transportation Plan. Within the plan, while excellent access to the Lewis and Clark Lake recreational area was noted, insufficient access to the Missouri River east of town was noted. Segments of 435th Avenue, SD Highways 50, 52, 153 were selected as areas that should be studied further to determine their feasibility. This would enable connections with

communities such as Volin, Utica, and Lesterville in addition to the connections emphasized most heavily in this proposal. On 2/28/23, Clay County adopted its Master Transportation Plan. Within the plan, trail connections to Spirit Mound, Gayville-Yankton, the Missouri River, and other county-level destinations were determined to be important. During the process of creating both counties' transportation plans, public support for trail connectivity was well-documented. Within the Yankton County plan, a public survey found trail and bike path development was the second preferred use of transportation funding aside from maintenance. In the Clay County plan, a public survey found that only 40% felt safe cycling. Qualitative results from the same survey found an appetite for connectivity between Yankton and Vermillion, the Frost Trail and North Alabama Trail to Clay County Park. While the planning process this grant would fund allows the project team to analyze the county as a whole and look for additional opportunities, the areas identified in these plans would be the initial focus to investigate feasibility and benefit-cost ratios.

#### Challenges to Be Addressed

Clay and Yankton Counties have limited capacities to conduct feasibility, benefit-cost analyses, preliminary environmental reviews, and community engagement needed to advance trail connectivity projects. Building momentum for the development of a trail network of this scope is challenging, particularly in a rural setting where resources are often limited. This creates the need for external assistance to supply the expertise and organizational structure to get projects off the ground and provide the funding needed to procure the professional services required.

The project will provide many benefits to the area. The area already has the Missouri National Recreational River and other public lands as a key asset that provides cultural, economic, and recreational benefit. A trail network connecting these locations would provide greater access and make the area more attractive to new residents and tourists. In more urbanized areas, the trail system would also provide an alternative to automobiles. For example, 88% of survey respondents in the Clay County Master Transportation Plan typically only drive. A trail network would also deliver beneficial public health outcomes and contribute to the area's identity.

#### **Detailed Statement of Work**

The project will fund planning activities that will include feasibility studies, benefit-cost analyses, and community engagement activities related to establishing trail connections among key areas within and between Clay and Yankton Counties, SD such as Yankton, SD and Vermillion, SD and various recreation areas on public lands owned by Clay County, Yankton County, South Dakota Game, Fish, and Parks, US Army Corps of Engineers, and the National Park Service. Planning activities would be supported by a partnership of Planning and Development District III (District III) and South Eastern Council of Governments (SECOG).

District III and SECOG are regional public planning agencies that would support the work of consultants.

#### **How the Project Addresses Challenges**

This work will directly address the transportation challenges raised in prior planning activities by providing a deeper analysis of the exact implementation possible/needed. It will advance objectives of various stakeholders by seeking specific easements and pathways. The effort will advance trail projects to a position to request construction funding.

#### Proposed Project Deliverables & Schedule



## Safety

This Project will address several safety concerns. Detangling pedestrian/cyclist travel from automobile travel will provide pedestrians and cyclists a safer experience because they are separated from automobiles. Recreationalists often rely on road shoulders for longer distance activities which could be made safer with dedicated trails, wider shoulders, or other safety measures. If awarded, an objective of the plan would be to identify the most appropriate and costeffective safety measures for each stretch of desired trailway. According to data from the South Dakota Department of Public Safety, over the 6-year period beginning on 1/1/17 and ending on 12/31/22, there were a total of 20 accidents in Yankton County involving bicyclists or pedestrians. Over the same period there were 8 accidents involving pedestrians in Clay County. In November 2023, a fatal accident involving a university professor riding a bicycle occurred in Vermillion. Accidents involving pedestrians and cyclists are more likely to be fatal because victims are more likely to experience forces that cause bodily trauma. Research indicates that the trend towards larger vehicles has increased the danger to pedestrians/cyclists (Edwards and Leonard, 82, Journal of Safety Research, 2022). Within the 2023 Clay County Master Transportation Plan, providing widened shoulders, bike lanes, shared-use paths, trails and/or sidewalks has been identified as a strategy to improve pedestrian and cyclist safety. Public input resulted in the 2015 Yankton County Master Transportation identifying the area near the Gavins Point Dam as a safety concern. Pedestrians and cyclists trying to enter the area to access the water or nearby already existing trails often come into conflict with automobiles.

#### **River Access Safety**

While there are identified deficiencies within the extant road and trail system that lead to conflict between pedestrians/cyclists and automobiles, the area is unique in that people want to access the Missouri River as well. Insufficient river access and trails along the river lead to people accessing the water in ways that are dangerous. Many people, especially visitors to the Missouri National Recreational River and Lewis and Clark Lake, traverse dangerous landscapes where they may slip and fall. Many bluff areas can have steep drops with jagged rocks that can cause bruises, cuts, scrapes, broken bones, torn muscles, and other injuries. During wet and muddy conditions, slips and falls are more likely. From time to time, individuals will attempt to walk along the river when they are actually on thin ice. In 2022, an individual who had gone hiking was found dead in an icy

backwater. A dedicated and enhanced trail system would provide visitors with a safe, easily identifiable path to access the water or travel alongside it.

South Dakota also has a proud hunting tradition, which while providing a fun activity for people to engage in, can also sometimes lead to conflict with other uses. Pedestrians and cyclists may unknowingly enter hunting areas, which increases the risk of an accident. This is problematic during the early spring waterfowl season and the main fall hunting season. Having dedicated paths will reduce hunter-hiker/cyclist conflict by giving hikers/cyclists a dedicated place to go that hunters would not use or at least know to exercise caution.

Finally, some residents have issues with trespassers crossing their property without their permission to access the water or shoreline. Gaining consensus from these stakeholders will be vital to the planning process. A public access trail would prevent these types of conflicts as well by providing these users a sanctioned experience.

## **Environmental Sustainability**

#### **Emissions Reduction**

This project would provide several environmental benefits. Those using the trail network for transportation to work or school would not need to rely on automobiles, which would reduce vehicle miles traveled. This would also reduce the carbon emissions associated with transportation as well as the wear and tear on roads. While the carbon emissions of an individual's commute are dependent on distance and fuel efficiency, a typical passenger vehicle releases 4.6 metric tons of carbon dioxide per year, according to the Environmental Protection Agency – assuming a fuel economy of 22 miles per gallon. Even though Yankton and Clay Counties have shorter commute times than the average for South Dakota, there is ample opportunity for residents in the Cities of Yankton and Vermillion to have a trail-oriented transportation option. For example, Yankton Thrive is developing workforce and affordable housing units on the eastern side of the City of Yankton to allow this population to reach the job centers in town without an automobile.

#### **Environmental Justice and Equity**

This project would also have several equity components that deliver environmental justice. Within the project area, there are several Census Tracts that have been identified as either Historically Disadvantaged or Areas of Persistent Poverty. Census Tract 9661 encompasses downtown Yankton and is a Disadvantaged Census Track. Census Tract 9663.02 covers the western portion of the City of Yankton and is an Area of Persistent Poverty. Likewise, Census Tracts 9657 and 9659 in and around the City of Vermillion are also Areas of Persistent Poverty.

Even though South Dakota's population is supermajority white, this project can provide positive impacts to historically marginalized populations. The City of Yankton has a higher Latino population per capita than the rest of the State. Likewise, the City of Vermillion has a more diverse population than the rest of the State. The relative diversity of these populations is driven by Yankton's immigrant population, which is more likely to be employed in positions that would benefit from the multi-family housing Yankton Thrive is developing as well as non-automotive transportation options. The City of Vermillion's relative diversity is driven by its student population. According to the University of South Dakota, approximately 1,700 students are considered first generation.

In of the 2023 Outdoor Foundation terms recreation. Report https://outdoorindustry.org/resource/2023-outdoor-participation-trends-report/) found that African American, Asian, and Latino populations were very interested in activities directly supported by trails. These activities include running, hiking, and cycling. While these activities are supported in the area, much of the emphasis of river use revolves around fishing and hunting, which were activities these populations at a nationwide level overall showed less interest in. The trail network could be planned in such a way that the City of Gayville and the Town of Meckling could be integrated into the system. This would provide residents in these communities opportunities for recreation, which would be beneficial as these communities have limited park space and recreational offerings. These communities could also benefit from economic development as those needing to take a rest may purchase food and beverages.

Spirit Mound is a key destination in Clay County. Its history originates with Native American legends from various tribes that suggested there were evil spirits that lived there. Lewis and Clark learned of these legends and explored the site. It is one of only a few locations along the Lewis and Clark expedition where it can be confirmed that Lewis and Clark were in a precise location. Every August 25 members of the Vermillion community commemorate Lewis and Clark's visit to the mound by walking to the site. Providing a safer trail experience and highlighting the history and meaning of the site from the perspective of the various Native American nations with ties to it would provide a forum to further the interests of tribes. If awarded, the meaningful involvement of Native American nations and groups with interests in the area would be pursued. Tribes would be invited to participate in the planning process to share their ideas, suggestions, and concerns. Tribes with known interests in the project area include the Yankton Sioux, Santee Sioux, the Ponca of Nebraska, the Omaha of Nebraska and Iowa, and the Otoe-Missouria Tribe. This would ensure that their interests are represented in the development and implementation of this project.

Planning activities would also pursue environmentally friendly practices. Options to include water permeable materials to reduce runoff associated with paved trails will be considered. Some trails in Clay County need to be repaired as a result of erosion from river run and flooding. New trails would be sited in locations outside of the 500-year floodplain to the greatest extent possible and in locations that are unlikely to change due to erosion in the foreseeable future. In March 2019, southeastern South Dakota endured a severe winter storm which resulted in catastrophic flooding (FEMA 4440-DR – 2019 Floods). The planning process would also consider including vegetative protection methods along trail segments, especially when routing in a more vulnerable area is unavoidable. Methods such as planting native tall-grass plants along the sides of the trail will absorb runoff, prevent erosion, and provide habitat to insects and small mammals. In locations where it is feasible, larger prairie restorations could be sited beside trails, which could support larger animals. In these locations, interpretive signage could also educate users about the importance of prairie habitats. According to the Nature Conservancy, America's prairie ecosystems once rivaled the African Serengeti in terms of biodiversity. The conversion of the land for agricultural use means only 1% of native prairie remains. As such, preservation, restoration,

and recreation of prairies is a critical habitat concern – especially since these areas support species that contribute to several of the Missouri River's outstanding resource values.

Another environmental benefit of developing a trail network along the river corridor is that there are development pressures in areas that contribute to scenic and ecological values. Housing developments along the bluffs and banks of the Missouri River would detract from these scenic values and would likely sprawl. Clay and Yankton Counties have zoning measures in place to protect these areas, but trail development would provide further protection against degradation to the viewshed. Sprawl-like development would have greater impacts on habitat integrity than trails.

## Quality of Life

The project will provide the region with an enhanced quality of life in several ways. A completed trail network provides users alternative transportation choices to access recreational assets. Increased active transportation will address public health concerns such as obesity and mental well-being. The planning process will optimize for paths that will ensure connectivity to other types of assets. For example, the planning process would emphasize connectivity to downtown and historic districts because they are centers of local business. These would often be trip origination or destination points. For example, a desired outcome of the planning process would be to ensure that the Yankton Meridian District is strongly integrated into the broader trail network. Yankton Thrive, the chamber of commerce in Yankton, is in the process of developing workforce and affordable housing for the area. One objective of Yankton Thrive is to develop housing in proximity to the Meridian District to allow the workforce to walk and ride their bikes to work. Some of the housing units that Yankton Thrive will be developing are income restricted to households making below 80% of the area median income. Apartment units for workforce housing, even if market rate, will still primarily service moderate- and middle-income households. Similarly, establishing connections with Downtown Vermillion and the University of South Dakota campus would provide students and faculty transportation alternatives to attend class and work. College-age students are typically low-income and are more reliant on transportation alternatives.

The area is in part defined by the outstanding resource values of its recreation areas. The Missouri National Recreational River (MNRR) is a unit of the National Park Service (NPS) and a unit of the Wild and Scenic Rivers system. It consists of a 39-mile district and a 59-mile district. The project area encompasses the 59-mile district and its surroundings on the South Dakota side of the Missouri River. MNRR has seven outstanding resource values including cultural, ecological, fish and wildlife, free-flowing condition, geological, scenic, and recreational. Cultural values of the area include its associated history with the Lewis and Clark expedition, the fact that Yankton, SD was a key location for African Americans who homesteaded in the Great Plains following the Civil War, surviving wreckages of steamboats like the North Alabama, the interactions between the river, and the Native American nations that have historical ties and/or are still present in the area such as the Yankton Sioux, Santee Sioux, and Ponca Tribe of Nebraska. Scenic values are imbued by its many overlooks and vistas along its bluffs, which have geological values in that they are composed of silt and Niobrara. Recreational values for the area include a wide variety of camping opportunities for RVs, car campers, and more primitive backcountry camping. There are also access points to reach the Missouri River, which is the main attraction in the area for fishing, kayaking, and hunting.

Public lands in the area also allow for opportunities to hunt on land. MNRR owns two properties on the Nebraska side of the river and two islands. Recreation areas along Lewis and Clark Lake are managed by the US Army Corps of Engineers and South Dakota Game Fish and Parks. Clay County manages Clay County Park. Groups such as the Friends of the Missouri National Recreational River, South Dakota Canoe and Kayak Association, and others are local organizations that speak to the amenity that recreation and natural areas along the river provide.

This project would involve the participation of a variety of stakeholders and meaningfully advance the missions.

## **Improves Mobility and Community Connectivity**



The main purpose of this proposal would be to acquire the funding needed to complete the planning and public engagement activities to ensure that any trail development adequately addresses the deficiencies in connectivity identified in both Counties' respective Master Transportation Plans. It is currently known that establishing connections among the Cities of Gayville, Vermillion, and Yankton and the Town of Meckling is a goal. It is also currently known that connecting these communities with recreational opportunities offered by Clay County, the City of Yankton, US Army Corps of Engineers, South Dakota GFP, and river access to the MNRR is also a critical component of the project.

For the parts of the trails that are within the Cities of Yankton and Vermillion, the planning team will ensure that connections to areas with concentrations of lower income people and job centers are established. In both communities, this means connecting their respective university campuses with their downtown districts. In the case of the City of Yankton, Yankton Thrive has already prioritized providing workforce housing near job centers and is currently developing a multifamily housing project that will serve low to middle income residents.

While the primary function of the trail system would be recreational and short-distance commuting, for the avid user, some long-distance commuting via the trail is possible. According to OnTheMap data, Yankton County had a job inflow of 4,623 inflow, 7,477 local, and 3,694 outflow in 2021. For Clay County, the same figures are 2,870, 2730, and 2,896 respectively. 409 people live in Clay County and work in the City of Yankton, whereas 242 people live in Yankton County and work in Vermillion. While this is a small percentage and not the main objective of the project, some commuting may occur. More importantly, the trail system's prominence would promote non-vehicle commuting. In 2021, 60.7% of the City of Yankton's workforce was local. In Vermillion, it was 49.7%. The trail would be unsuitable for the movement of commercial goods.

#### Accessibility - Empowering Through Information

Accessible trail development is also an important consideration that the planning process would incorporate. Paved and improved trails will be implemented where practical and financially sound. However, the recreation profession is shifting to an informational model to address accessibility concerns. Disabilities are diverse, and individuals with more severe mobility-related disabilities can still use what would have been traditionally considered inaccessible with assistive technologies like all-terrain wheelchairs (ATW). Given the high expense of specialized equipment (ATWs cost about \$3,000) and that many disabled individuals have restricted income, there is a role for government to reduce the barrier to using an ATW. For example, the counties would explore having an ATW available for check-out, likely in partnership and cooperation with other stakeholders. Information about the trail's surface, incline, and barriers will be publicized. This is important because different users have different accessibility concerns. People with disabilities want information, so they are empowered to select experiences that are accessible to them that are also fun and challenging.

## **Economic Competitiveness and Opportunity**

South Dakota Tourism

South Dakota's economy relies extensively on tourism. According to 2022 statistics from The South Dakota Department of Tourism, 14.4 million visitors spent \$4.7 billion, generated \$361 million in tax revenue, and supported 56,826 jobs. South Dakota's gross receipts for FY 22 were \$2.25 billion, meaning tourism generated one-sixth of the State's tax revenues. The project area includes the Missouri National Recreational River, a unit of the National Park Service. According to Park Superintendent Dimmick, national parks are a vital part of our nation's economy, especially for park gateway communities where millions of visitors each year find a place to sleep and eat, hire outfitters and guides, and make use of other local services that help drive a vibrant tourism and outdoor recreation industry already benefiting economically from its outstanding recreational assets. According to economists with NPS and USGS, in calendar year 2022 MNRR provided an injection of over \$6.6 million dollars into the area's local economies. MNRR supported 86 local jobs for a cumulative benefit of \$8.1 million. Due to challenges in counting visitation to a riverpark, park staff believe these figures are underestimates and that the actual benefit provided by the MNRR is greater. The park is actively pursuing more robust methods to accurately determine the visitation statistics that these determinations are based on. Much of this benefit is concentrated in the Yankton area, so a trail network would allow for the geographic extent of this benefit to expand. The MNRR area is a unique asset that can be further leveraged for eco-recreational tourism.

#### **Economic Development Activities**



The area is also part of the national Lewis and Clark Historic Trail (LCHT), which spans across the nation from Pennsylvania to Oregon. LCHT recently launched the <a href="lewisandclark.travel">lewisandclark.travel</a> site. The website is intended to be a one-stop shop for tourists wishing to recreate the journeys of Lewis and Clark. The website will feature a Virtual Tour of the Lewis and Clark expedition, which is being developed in conjunction with Terrain 360. Over the course of the next few years, Terrain 360 will create a Google Street Map like experience of Lewis and Clark's path – some of which includes the Missouri River beside Clay and Yankton County and key features such as Spirit Mound. The website will also provide users with travel information about downtown districts, local restaurants, local gift shops, local hotels and inns, museums, events, and recreation activities. The

program also has a recognition initiative that allows communities and qualifying businesses to promote themselves through their support of the LCHT. The City of Vermillion intends to apply to be recognized as a community supporter in April. MNRR is working with its partners to find as many supporters for the program as possible to ensure their inclusion on the website. The creation of a trail network could be a prominent feature to be promoted on the site and connect visitors from all over the country (and world) with information about experiences in Clay and Yankton Counties. Towns along and near the trail might develop economic strategies to become "trail towns." This is similar to a concept that is familiar in the "rails-to-trails" community.

#### **Supporting Small Businesses**

It would also be desirable to ensure that there is equitable benefit from the trail network. If awarded, minority-owned, women-owned, and veteran-owned businesses would be sought as contractors and consultants for planning, engineering, and construction. If a business that meets the federal criteria for these classifications could compete, assistance would be provided to help it gain certification from the Small Business Administration. This would not only provide the business with an opportunity to compete for projects associated with this proposal, but also allow the business to be invited to other opportunities involving federal contracts. Trail connectivity would also benefit the main streets in the towns the network crosses. It would be a desired outcome for there to be trail connections amongst the Cities of Gayville, Vermillion, and Yankton and the Town of Meckling. The rails-to-trails' trail town concept would also promote economic opportunities for small businesses and entrepreneurs.

#### **Property Values**

Economic benefits of a trail system also include the associated increase in property values. Research published by Lindsey et al. in 2004 through the *Journal of Park and Recreation Administration* used hedonic methods and documented a positive relationship between trail proximity and housing values. Another by Asabere and Huffman in 2009 through *The Journal of Real Estate Finance and Economics* also used hedonic methods on 10,000 homes in San Antonio, TX to determine that trails, greenbelts, and trails with greenbelts are associated with approximately 2, 4, and 5%, increases in property values, respectively.

## State of Good Repair

#### Current Needs

One outcome the planning process will need to achieve is planning for the repair of some existing trails. Trails in the area degrade over time as a result of flooding and river wandering. Trails needing attention include Clay County Park's trail and the Cotton Park Trail in Vermillion. The Marne Creek Trail in Yankton was damaged in a flood, but the process is underway to repair that trail.

#### Maintenance and Volunteer Community

New trails that will be developed because of this project would be sited in locations beyond the 500-year floodplain as much as possible. Locations that are unlikely to change due to erosion in the foreseeable future would be desirable. The planning process would also emphasize vegetative protection methods along trail segments, especially when routing in a more vulnerable area is unavoidable. Methods such as planting native tall-grass plants along the sides of the trail will absorb runoff and prevent erosion. This in turn prevents damage to the trail and extends its service life. Clay and Yankton Counties would be responsible for the maintenance of these trails, but the varied interests across local organizations, state agencies, and federal agencies would continue their support of the trail system and assist to the extent possible. Local organizations would be engaged to provide volunteer labor to maintain the trails through clean up events. An adopt-a-trail program would also be established, and a non-profit organization could be formed to be the "steward" of the trail. Local volunteer support for public stewardship is already occurring. Each year, FOMNRR hosts a river cleanup event. MNRR has hired a Community Volunteer Ambassador to launch a volunteer program for the park. MNRR and FOMNRR have updated an application to National Park Trust to support volunteer removal of invasive plants at its properties.

#### **Funding**

While using volunteerism for trail maintenance will facilitate community ownership and reduce costs, some costs remain inevitable. The Counties would work with stakeholders and the grassroots to establish a non-profit group that would raise funds needed for trail maintenance. These costs are difficult to predict because of the numerous factors involved. These factors include climate, vegetation profile, and economic geography. Nonetheless, according to a 2015 RailstoTrails report, maintenance costs ranged from \$500 to \$1000 per mile when considering volunteerism. In 2024 dollars, this is \$650-\$1300, which over a network of about 60 miles, comes to \$39,000 to \$78,000 per year. While predicting where in this range this system would fall, South Dakotahas a lower cost of living and doing business than other areas of the US, and a 60-mile system would generate some economies of scale that would be advantageous. These costs could be covered by fundraising, federal and state grants, and the counties. The hired consultant would be responsible for providing more detailed analysis. Finally, it is important to consider that as MNRR data shows, public expense in recreation generates net-gain for local economies before considering non-market benefits.

### Partnership and Collaboration

#### Land Management Agencies

The recreational and natural resources of the Missouri River are managed by a wide array of agencies and partnerships. Lewis and Clark Lake, dam operations at Gavins Point, and several recreation areas are managed by the US Army Corps of Engineers. The National Park Service, through Missouri National Recreational River, manages its 59-mile district that meanders through the project area. (All four of MNRR's properties are in the 59-mile district.) South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks manages Lewis and Clark Recreation Area, Chief White Crane Recreation Area, Pierson Ranch Recreation Area, Myron Grove River Access and several hunting grounds. Clay County Park is managed by the Clay County Park Board, and the City of Yankton manages Riverside Park. While each of these agencies is responsible for managing their own properties, there is considerable collaboration and support. For example, MNRR provides interpretive signage on properties managed by other entities. Other partnerships for management of the area extend to relationships between land management agencies and other organizations — for example Mount Marty University provides some housing for seasonal employees. Clay and Yankton Counties work with all these stakeholders.

#### **Diverse Support**

This project has considerable support from a wide array of stakeholders as demonstrated by the letters of support included as attachments to this application. This project enjoys the support of federal, state, local, educational, and non-profit institutions. Engagement and relationship-building with the tribal governments previously identified will be pursued upon award to ensure all stakeholders have buy-in for the trail network and its outcomes.

#### **Minimizing Disruption**

The actual facilities to house trails will be acquired through a combination of possible strategies. Along roadsides South Dakota provides a 66 foot right of way, which provides ample space for a trail. For example, along State Highway 19, the main automobile lanes are 24 feet wide. In other locations, the use of abandoned railways will also be utilized through programs and initiatives such as Rails-to-Trails. Finally, local landowners will be educated about easements. Much of the area is agricultural, but many private properties along desirable pathways may also contain marginal lands. Educating landowners about voluntary easements that would permit them to gain additional revenue and enable the trail network to grow. Prime agricultural land is the least desirable because both counties have identified the protection of agricultural uses as important in their planning documents.

#### **Community Engagement**

Public engagement occurred as activities for each of the counties' respective master transportation plan. Additionally, Clay County Park held a public input session on 1/19/23 where participants overwhelmingly expressed support for enhancing recreation assets and trails in the area. In a survey conducted in Spring 2023 participants rated connecting with nature, gathering with others, and fun as things they enjoyed about the County Park. The survey also found that 79.2% of respondents would walk along an interpretive trail with informative signs, while 72% would enjoy hiking and biking trips for socializing and health benefits. A majority would be interested in utilizing the MNRR Water Trail.

Following suggestions offered to them at their debrief for the FY23 version of this application, the counties hosted two public engagement events. One was held on 11/2/23 in Yankton and the other on 11/6/23 in Vermillion. The events featured a presentation, a Question-and-Answer session, and a dot-map activity. (See attachment.)

Following the events, some members of the public expressed concerns about private property rights

and whether the public was being properly involved. The counties are applying for planning money but have reaffirmed that they will continue to have an open dialogue with the public and private property owners every step of the way. South Dakota is a state that highly values private property rights. Many private property owners in the region had land condemned when dams were built on the Missouri River in the 1950s. The counties will respect these sensitivities by committing to not using involuntary means to gain non-existing access to land needed for trail development. The counties will only consider consultants who respect this aspect of the area's culture.

#### Innovation

#### Collaborations and Partnerships

Several components of this project are innovative to the area. There are few trail networks in South Dakota that would be as connected and intensive as the one desired as an outcome of the process. The trail itself would complement the designated water trail along the Missouri River, incorporating a land component with the river aspect. The water trail is sponsored by the Cities of Vermillion and Yankton, Friends of the Missouri National Recreational River, the Izaac Walton League, Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail, Lewis and Clark Natural Resources District, the Missouri River Institute, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, the Sierra Club and South Dakota Game, Fish, and Parks. Working with public and private partners, the trail could support kayak rentals for a land-water experience that would be new to the area and relatively rare elsewhere. This trail system would complement the public land holdings of various entities spanning multiple levels of government.

In preparing this application, Clay and Yankton Counties have engaged with a wide array of stakeholders. Following its submission of its 2023 application, the work group representing Clay and Yankton Counties, staff from the National Park Service (NPS), District III, and SECOG have continued discussing the planning project. Letters of support have been sought out from educational, non-profit, state, and federal partners. If awarded, these groups would continue to be engaged with the project. Groups such as FOMNRR would work with the Counties and NPS to involve as many members of the community as possible in the planning process. Since the previous application, stakeholders have reached out for best-practices and advice from those who already have an extensive trail portfolio, for example the Ice Age National Scenic Trail (IATR). IATR have offered to continue providing ideas and advice as the effort continues.

#### In-kind Match and Volunteerism

Both counties are willing to provide in-kind match in various forms. Both counties can offer staff time as well as meeting space for public meetings and discussions during both the planning and implementation phases. Maintenance of constructed trails would likewise involve innovative methods, primarily through the partnership of volunteer organizations. Groups such as FOMNRR could assist with activities such as trash removal, edging, and weed removal. Support for volunteerism and public stewardship would be bolstered through activities such as bench sponsorships, bench painting, and adopt-a-trail programs. Public stewardship through volunteerism is something that is emerging in the area. MNRR is working with FOMNRR on boosting public stewardship on its properties. To this end, MNRR has hired a Community Volunteer Ambassador and is pursuing grant opportunities to outfit the program. Meanwhile, the Spirit Mound Trust, a local non-profit group, already actively assists South Dakota GFP with maintenance activities at Spirit Mound. Different organizations in the community could also be engaged such as local Cub Scout Packs and Boy Scout Troops in trailside and park cleanup projects.

The MNRR could also enlist "Junior Rangers" to assist in various activities.

Sustainable Construction Methods

Construction methods for the trail would likewise be innovative to the extent possible. Careful siting and the use of vegetative methods to protect the trail from degradation due to river wander and erosion would be explored. This would allow for multiple other desirable outcomes to be achieved including better and scenic values, habitat for wildlife, pollination. The use of porous materials not already in use would be investigated and would allow for water to penetrate paved trails, reducing runoff and impacts on soil beneath the path.

#### **Instilling Community Pride**

Finally, trails will be integrated into the regional community through several means. Clay and Yankton Counties along with their partners would ensure that trails are well documented and represented on popular services such as Google Maps and All Trails. Interpretive signage along the trail could contain QR codes that would allow users to access interactive interpretation modules through services such as StoryMaps. There is no documented use of StoryMaps or a similar platform being used for public education along a trail system in the area. Interpretive themes along the trail can span a wide array of topics including, but not limited to: Native American history of the area, the Lewis and Clark Expedition, the area's reliance on the Missouri River for water, the history of Steamboats, African American Homesteaders, the development of the Gavins Point Dam, wildlife, ecology, dark skies, and geology. Some of these themes, for example African American Homesteaders, have not been thoroughly explored in the interpretive products delivered by governments in the area. These efforts would coalesce to instill a community identity, sense of place, and local pride that is in part oriented around the trail system.

## **Project Readiness**

Upon award, Clay and Yankton Counties would be prepared to move forward with implementation of the project. Clay and Yankton Counties held a public input session for review of its Master Transportation Plan in November 2023, so the area is currently engaged with this topic. If awarded, the execution of a grant project would most likely occur near the end of peak season, so many summer programs and events would be winding down. This means that many of the relevant partners would be ready to engage in planning work.

Clay County, as the primary agent for this application, would be prepared to complete the needed administrative work of reviewing payment requests. In recent years, Clay County has received grants through FEMA disaster relief, CARES Act Relief funds, American Rescue Plan Act funds, Historic Preservation Grants, Department of Justice grants, among other federal programs. Clay County has experience working with DOT grants passed through the State of South Dakota. Clay County posts the necessary notices as required for non-discrimination and equality opportunity employment practices and is committed to supporting diversity, equity, and inclusion in the administration of government programs.

Grant administration activities would be carried out through the County Auditor and Commissioner Geoffrey Gray-Lobe. Consultants would be eligible for payments upon completion of major project milestones (holding community input sessions, completion of draft reports/plans, final drafts of reports/plans etc.). Requests for payments would be reviewed by the County Auditor and submitted to the full County Commission for approval. The County Auditor would also be responsible for completing reports and updates to DOT. The current County Auditor is Carri Crum, who has been the Clay County Auditor for almost 11 years. Prior, she had been the Deputy Auditor for 9 years.

Commissioner Geoffrey Gray-Lobe would be the contact person for the grant. Commissioner Gray-Lobe was elected in November 2022 for a five-year term. Prior he has been the contact person for two grant applications. Although he would be new to being a liaison for an active federal grant, he was the Director of Communications at Vermillion Federal Credit Union for almost four years. Gray-Lobe has spent most of his life in Clay County and is deeply passionate about the area and campaigned on a platform of economic development through sustainability initiatives. He also was an intern and biological science technician with Missouri National Recreational River for two consecutive summers. Should Gray-Lobe become unable to continue being the contact person, the Chairperson would serve in the role or delegate it to another commissioner. In Clay County, commissioners are considered half-time (20 hours per week).

Layne Stewart is the Clay County Emergency Management Director. He will serve as an on-the-ground liaison with Gray-Lobe. Clay and Yankton County would have access to technical guidance from District III and SECOG as well as MNRR. Both Counties would be able to provide meeting spaces without issue.

Upon award, Clay County would convene the relevant partners and form a panel that would oversee the procurement of consultants. The panel would consist of stakeholders comprising the various interests in the project. The partnership would utilize the request for proposals (RFP) method of procurement and administer the process. The panel would develop criteria and a method to evaluate proposals. Factors that are often considered for projects like these include expertise of personnel determined through years of experience and qualifications such as licenses and certifications, experience with trail planning and trail study projects, familiarity with the project area, past work, reference checks, and cost. Small businesses and businesses owned by women, minorities, and veterans would actively be invited to participate in procurement processes. The group would recommend the proposal which is the most comprehensive and responsive of the proposals received.

Clay County would be responsible for ensuring that Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR) are followed. Within the FAR, Clay County is aware of provisions including but not limited to Buy America, ADA Regulations, Davis Bacon Act, and Civil Rights requirements.

Bill Conkling Deputy Planning & Zoning Administrator, expressed appreciation for Buildings & Grounds Supervisor Jeff Pfeifle and Highway Superintendent Mike Sedlacek and their employees for outstanding snow removal efforts this year. Chairman Marquardt closed public comment.

Oath of Office: Kasi Foss read the official oath for Deputy Auditor.

Highway Superintendent Mike Sedlacek appeared for approval of a resolution for spring load limits and authorization to advertise for annual supplies.

**Action 2415C**: A motion was made by Kettering and seconded by Klimisch to approve the following resolution. All present voted aye; motion carried, 5-0.

#### Resolution 2024 - 2

WHEREAS, seasonal climatic changes can be detrimental to our Yankton County Highways, and

WHEREAS, the Yankton County Board of Commissioners desire to protect existing Yankton County Paved Highways, ultimately saving tax dollars and,

WHEREAS, South Dakota Codified Laws 32-14-6 allows for the reduction of the legal weight limit, which may be carried upon all county hard surfaced roads within Yankton County, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that certain Yankton County Highways be restricted to a load limit of 6 tons per axle imposed on trucks, trailers, and wagons with the exception of:

- 7 ton per axle on 430<sup>th</sup> Ave from 300<sup>th</sup> St north to SD HWY 46
- 7 ton per axle on 450<sup>th</sup> Ave from SD HWY 50 north to 310<sup>th</sup> St

- Legal load limit on East Side Drive from SD HWY 50 north 1.5 miles to Whiting Drive
- Legal load limit on County Road 210/Deer Boulevard north of SD HWY 50, extending north 3.2 miles to the entrance of Dakota Plains Ag Center
- County Primary Gravels and County Maintained township gravels as deemed necessary by the Highway Superintendent

Yankton County will allow a permit process for non-divisible loads for overweight/oversize loads. There will be two options:

Option 1: A single trip permit fee of \$150.00 for over 6 tons per axle or 80,000 lbs. Gross Vehicle Weight, with an additional \$25.00 fee for every 2,000 lbs. over 80,000 lbs. (with specified route)

Option 2: <u>An Annual permit fee of \$450.00 for over 6 tons per axle less than 70,000 lbs. Gross</u> Vehicle Weight.

The Yankton County Highway Superintendent will cause to be installed adequate warning signs notifying the traveling public of the load weight restrictions on the restricted county hard surfaced roads and that the restrictions will be in force upon placing of such signs until such signs are removed and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the penalty for the violation of the load restrictions shall be set force in SDCL 32-22-55.





# Judge: Norfolk-Area NRD Went Too Far In Sanctioning Board Member

LINCOLN Neb - A Norfolk area natural resources district board likely went too far in censuring a member of its board for confirming to a newspaper she had filed a complaint against a fellow board member.

U.S. District Judge John Ger-rard Issued an order Wednesday granting a preliminary injunc-tion sought by Mellssa Temple against the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District. Temple represents eastern Norfolk for the 15-county NRD.

Gerrard wrote that the board likely violated Temple's First Arvendmen! rights by retaliat-ing against her and limiting her access to travel reimbursements and per diem payments while doing board business. Temple was represented by the new First Amendment Clinic at the

University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Nebraska law requires NRDs to reimburse board members for their actual and necessary expenses incurred in connec-llon with their duties. Gerrard wrote. He found that the board's actions had a potential "chilling

effect" on Temple's speech.
"If Temple continues to
engage in protected speech,
such as informing the press of
how the sanctions are affecting her ability to govern, she might be subject to further sanctions," Gerrard wrote. "Temple's right to publicly criticize the LENRD's decision is enshrined by the First Amendment." Gerrard wrote that based

on history and tradition, a



government "cannot suspend the pay of an elected official as a sanction" and that suspending "Temple's right to receive reim-bursements for out-of-district travel maierially affects her ability to perform her duties for her constituents," The board, he wrote, has

the authority to remove Temple from subcommittees but, the judge wrote, the NRD and its voters should question whether it should.

It should.

In August, the NRD board prohibited Temple for a year from being reimbursed for any board-related travel expenses outside the district or per diem payments while working on board business. The board also stripped her position on any NRD subcommittees for the year.

in April, the board had rejected Temple's complaint alleging fellow board member Scott Clausen had spoken condescendingly to women tes-tifying to the board, dismissed public health threats to women and children and disparaged Temple's intellect.

Clausen soon filed his own complaint, criticizing Temple for confirming her complaint to the

Norfolk Daily News.
Temple on Wednesday said she was pleased with the judge's order and that her case was "much larger than just me." She said the order upholds and preserves "our fundamental freedoms."

"It's about the freedom to speak up without fear of retribution, the freedom to file complaints and not face unconstitutional forms of retali-ation, and the freedom to fully do the job I was elected to do," she sald, One of her lawyers, Daniel

Gutman, sald Temple and the clinic want to "vindicate these First Amendment rights." NRD attorney Don Blan-

kenau had argued that as a legislative body, the board had

Blankenau and the NRD's legal team argued Temple had not been limited in any way that Infringed her rights or the

rights of her voters.

Brian Bruckner, the NRD's new general manager, said Thursday that the organization and its attorneys were aware of the judge's order. "The District has no other

comment on the matter at this particular time other than to state that we respect the opinion of the Court and that we will comply with the terms of the order," he said. Gerrard had called on both

parties earlier this month to find a way forward. Wednesday's injunction stays in place until a trial is held or the case is otherwise resolved.

Frankly, this whole ordeal rranxly, mis whole ordest has the potential to erode pub-lic confidence in the LENRD's ability to govern, 'the judge wrote. "The LENRD simply does not have the power, under Nebraska law and the United States Constitution to withhold States Constitution, to wilhhold Temple's relmbursement and per diem payments."

LINCOLN, Neb. -- A Minden School Board member who was removed from the board in 2021 after refusing io wear a mask during the COVID-19 pandemic has been reinstated to her position.

#### WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM

The Future Fund gets its money from South Dakota employers, whose payments to the fund are tied to payroll taxes for unemployment benefits. The unemployment payroll tax is calculated by a complex set of lormulas that includes a percentage of the first \$15,000 of some employees annual earnings. The Future Fund receives a fraction of an additional parcent on the first which the state.

Fund receives a fraction of an additional percent on top of that, which the state describes as an "investment fee."

According to the state Department of Labor and Regulation, 28,261 employers paid \$23 million into the Future Fund in 2022. which equated to an average of \$814 per employer. Governors can spend as much or as little from the fund as they are and redisciplants have altered the want, and legislators have altered the contribution rates over the years, so the balance fluctuates. Noem has distributed \$30.34 million from the fund this year.

Since the fund's inception 36 years ago, governors have awarded a total of about \$300 million from It, according to an estimate by the Governor's Office of Economic Development, which said it does not have complete historical records. Utilizing government reports and newspaper archives, South Dakota Searchlight was able to document \$302.5 million in total spending. Nearly two-thirds of it happened under the last two

Noem has spent a total of \$57 mil-lion from the fund since she took office in 2019, and her predecessor Dennis Daugaard spent \$163 million during his eight years in office.

## LEGISLATORS REACT, NOEM SPOKESMAN RESPONDS

State Representative Scott Odenbach, a Republican from Spearfish, said he is unsettled by governors spending so much taxpayer money without oversight. He said economic development too often involves the government picking winners and losers.

"Like so much of government, a wellintentioned program has expanded lar beyond its original purpose," Odenbach sald.

Mickelson told legislators during his State of the State speech that year that South Dakota needed a lund "for long-term investments, for building the Infrastructure.

son was the secretary of labor at the time and helped write the law, She said the Mickelson administration "deliberately tried not to narrowly define what the

fund was for.
"You'll know it when you see it," Johnson sald, referring to the law's use of the broad term "economic development" and what it's meant to different governors over the years. Mickelson chose to focus on investments in research, scholarships and programs on university campuses

#### HOW OTHER GOVERNORS **USED THE FUND**

Archived news stories and other historical sources indicate former governor Mickelson and his successor, Walter Dale Miller, spent at least a combined \$22.5 million from the year of the lund's creation in 1987 through 1994, Bili Jank-

low spent at least \$5 million, and Mike Rounds spent about \$55 million. Mickelson focused on research, lab equipment and university programs. By the end of 1990, he was touting in a news-paper column that his administration had funded over 80 research- and businesslinked ventures through the fund.

Miller kept a similar focus after Mickelson died in a plane crash, using \$500,000 per year from the fund lor a scholarship program started by Mickel-

By 1994, during Miller's administra-tion, the fund was being credited for Improving the University of South Dakota
Medical School, and for funding research
Into a swine disease that saved producers

\$4 million a year.

Then Janklow became governor for

the second time. In 1995, Janklow ended the use of Future Fund dollars for the Mickelson scholarship program, deeming it an improper use of a fund intended by law for re resent and economic development He was criticized by Democrats for taking the definition of the fund too literally

"It's not a proper transfer," Janklow told the Argus Leader at the time. "It's not a legitimate use of those funds. I have no choice. It's not my money, it's the public's

money,"
In 2003, Rounds became governor and began using the fund to help businesses and train employees, and for research and lob creation.

a suicide, it was revealed that he was about to be charged with a crime. As he left state government at the end of the Rounds administration, Benda allegedly pressured the recipient of a \$1 million Fu-ture Fund grant to redirect about half of the money to help Benda's new employer

Cover Benda's salary.

Daugaard became governor in 2011.

He used the fund for everything from railroad improvements to scholarships. He awarded \$51 million in 2014 alone, with awarded 351 million in 2014 alone, with recipients ranging from tech schools and economic development corporations to a trailer manufacturer in Mitchell.

#### NOEM'S EXPENDITURES

Some of Noem's Puture Pund spending has been similar to Daugaard's.
This year, she gave \$1.6 million to help establish and grow the South Dakota Trade Association (run by U.S. Sen. John's Thune's son-Indame, Luke Lindberg), \$3 million to the North Sloux City Economic Development Corporation for an industrial park, and \$7.94 million to the Department of Labor and Regulation to expand apprenticeship programs, among other awards.

Noem's \$5 million workforce recruitment campaign, financed by the Future Fund, leatures her in commercials filling the roles of plumbers and welders and other high need jobs. She's touted the

campaign as a success.
"We are building a winning workforce and ensuring that our state's economy will continue to thrive for generations to come," she said in a news release about

the campaign.

But some lawmakers have expressed frustration about what they've described as a lack of clarity about the campaign's

results.

For example, the Governor's Office has sald "over 2,000 applicants have advanced to the final stages of moving" through the Freedom Works Here campaign. But under questioning from lawmakers, administration officials said that's the number of out-of-state people who have asked for a state-assigned job adviser to help them find work in South Dakota, and the administration does not know how many of those people are directly attributable to the campaign.

Reporting by Sioux Falls Live has also revealed political connections between Noem and the Ohio-based firm that her administration chose to carry out the campaign and has raised questions about

campagn and nas chosen.

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
