
### **Bulldogs Veto Governors**






### '72 Growls





### Class of 1970 Selects











Under the guidance of head coach Dan Barker, the 1970 track squad showed the "spirit-drive-ability" already displayed by this year's athletic teams. The varsity track team composed of eight seniors, seven juniors, and fifteen sophomores, was young in experience but strong in "spirit" and "ability." The daily workouts showed that the boys had the enthusiasm necessary for a great track squad. Coach Barker and Assistant Coaches Ron Erickson and Jim Cordts were the ones responsible for not only physical but also mental preparation of the tracksters. Track is similar to any sport; the athlete must have the right attitude to be any competitor at all.

Competition was at its best this year with Madison riding high among the leaders. Although they didn't have the depth needed to be a dominant leader, the Bulldogs' presence was noticed at every meet the team participated in. During the season the track team captured championship titles at the Trojan Relays in Worthington, at the Madison Invitational Track Meet, at the Region III Meet, and finished third in the ESD Meet. At the highly talented Howard Wood Relays, the Madison tracksters showed their fortitude and competiveness. Bulldog miler Jeff Schemmel, already a veteran competitor as a sophomore, won his specialty over a group of runners coming from a three state area. The mile relay team was victorious over the highly favored Sioux Falls and Sioux City schools, while the 440 relay, the 880 relay, and sprint medley relay placed second behind Sioux City Central and Watertown respectively. Weeks of hard work have been rewarded by this outstanding showing.

The success of this year's squad was due unfortunately to a few individuals. Success of the year could not have been accomplished without the whole team working together; however, the outstanding effort of a handful of boys made the team a success. Jeff Schemmel, who lived for the mile, workouts the whole year. This dedicated effort had its rewards though, since Jeff was defeated only once and has a 4:16.9 mile as his best time. Jeff was also a member of the two-mile relay and medley relay teams. Co-captain Vernon Caulk, voted most valuable trackster by his teammates, was one of the largest contributors to the team's success. Vern was undefeated this year in 440 yard dash competition and was busy setting records in this event. Vernon's newly-established records include a clocking of 49.1 for the state meet record, a 49.6 time in the ESD Meet, and 50.1 time at the Madison Invitational Meet. Also, Vernon's time of 49.1 is only one-tenth of a second from tieing the all-time state record in the 440 yard dash. Vern ran on the 880 relay, two mile relay, sprint medley, and mile relay teams.

Tom Dockendorf, the other co-captain for the 1970 track season, contributed considerably to the team. Tom ran on the 880, 440, sprint medley, and mile relays and the 220 yard dash. Although not as outstanding as Vernon and Jeff in the individual events, Tom ran a respectable 23.1 clocking in the 220 at the Region Track Meet. Tom was a member crack mile relay team who, along with Caulk, Larson, and Page pulled a few upsets this year. Besides the victory at Howard Wood, the relay team was narrowly defeated by Sioux Falls Lincoln in the state meet. The Bulldogs ran 3:22.3, three-tenths of a second behind the Patriots.

Other senior contributors to the team's success were Dan Crippen, Don Johnson, Ted Poncelet, Jeff Page, and Mike Hoffman. Dan was the senior leader in the discus, while Don and Ted ran sprints and relays. Jeff ran the middle distance races and relays and was accompanied by Mike Hoffman the 440 yard dash.

Next year returning tracksters will be led by co-captains Rocky Houser and Don Larson. Although the seniors will be missed, the sophomores and juniors have the ability to form a team that could reach goals never imagined. Jeff Schemmel, Rocky Houser, Don Larson, Terry Stanford, Mike Sullivan, Jack Treloar, and Steve Hewitthave exhibited potential and determination as competitors; watch these boys next year for they could produce the best track season Madison has had yet.





#### A Big Moment In History

The tracing finger of history touched down briefly in Madison on June 3, 1969. The occasion was the dedication of the Karl E. Mundt Library on the campus of Dakota State College. It marked the first visit to Madison by an incumbent U.S. President in 70 years. Nixon's presence at the dedication stemmed from a long personal and political friendship between the President and Sen. Mundt, who calls Madison his home.

As the big day arrived, the weatherman got into the spirit as June 3 was as beautiful a summer day as South Dakota has to offer and a crowd of 8,500 people, including the First Family, Governor Farrar, and numerous college dignitaries, stood under bright sunshine to see their President. The Madison High School Band provided patriotic melodies to honor the President and the honoree.
