

3:15 arrives. The extra-curricular extravanganza is about to begin. You can see the mental calculations going on in-










Coronation ceremonies began at 7:30 Tuesday night. Pink, burgandy, and silver were chosen to color this years homecoming theme "The Best of Times '85."







### STARS SHINE BRIGHTLY IN '85

Sixth on the program was a skit by Tim Ewald entitled "At the Movies with Siskel and Ebert." They reviewed "Friday the 13th Part 7."


In the final act, the football cheerleaders performed the "Hokey Pokey School Song" with the accompaniment of the Kazoo Corps.







According to director and set designer Jim Miller, "The festival was a memorable experience for everyone involved. The productions showed a great variety of approaches to academic theatre in South Dakota."





The story takes place in a remote part of Great Britain and concerns itself with the exploits of Toad of Toad Hall, (Cory Heidelberger) and his on going pursuit of his latest hobby; Motor Cars. His friends Mole, Ratty, and Badger, (Susan Schrepel, Colleen Lang, Jeff Venekamp) try to convince him of the folly of his ways. In their efforts, they meet up with the Chief Weasel and his fellow cohorts—the Foxes and the Weasels.

Heading up the entire production was Mr. J. "Doc" Miller in the dual role of director and set designer. Ms. Nancy Edwards was in charge of musical direction and Mr. Stuart Lickteig assisted in bringing the technical aspects of the show together. Patty Mauf served as the assistant to the director.







The Oral Interpretation season for Madison High School began on October 5th with a trip to Clear Lake. The team returned with the third place sweepstakes trophy and Rebecca Johnson winning first in both Prose and Poetry. The next trip was to Aberdeen, where Rebecca again won first in Poetry. DSC hosted the Dakota Invitational on October 26th. Several Madison students were in finals-Sue Muller in Drama, Heather Means in Oratory, Monica Nelson in Humor, and Rebecca Johnson in Prose and Poetry, Trophy winners were Monica-first in Humor and Rebecca-second in Poetry and Prose. The Madison team won the second place sweepstakes trophy. The final invitational of the season was at Watertown, where Rebecca won third in Poetry.

The Local Oral Interp Contest was held on November 4th. The winners in each category were: Monica Nelson in Humor, Sue Muller in Drama, Heather Means in Oratory, Val Ross and Kelli Calmus in Duet Acting, and Rebecca Johnson in Prose and Poetry. These advanced to the region contest in Aberdeen. The team did very well at regionals, with Sue, Monica, Heather, and Rebecca receiving superiors. Those advancing to the state tournament were Monica in Humor, Heather in Oratory, and Rebecca in both Prose and Poetry. The State Oral Interp Contest was held in Huron on November 22nd and 23rd. Monica Nelson received an excellent in Humor, Heather Means an excellent in Oratory, and Rebecca Johnson superiors in both Prose and Poetry. The 1885-86 debate season began slowly with competition at SDSU and Beresford which yielded no trophies. However, by the third tournament things began to change. At the Aberdeen Ringneck Tournament in December the champ team of Tim Ewald and Brett Carlson won third; Heather Means placed first in Novice Oratory; Rebecca Johnson placed fourth in Dramatic Interpretation; Monica Nelson placed fourth in Humorous Interpretation; Michael Paulukonis placed fifth in Novice Extempt. In December the squad also traveled to Brookings to compete in the Brookings Bell Tournament where Rebecca was first in Drama; Heather was second in Novice Oratory. And the novice debate team of Heather, Monica, Mike and Ryan placed fourth. The competition began in earnest in January with a trip to Sioux Falls for the Lincoln Silverbowl Tournament. Competing against 34 schools from 4 states, the MHS debators did very well. During the year the team competed in a dozen debate tournaments bringing home numerous trophies. Winding down the season at the Regional Debate Tournament in Huron, Tim Ewald and Brett Carlson placed first in the champ debate; Heather placed first in Oratory; Jeanelle placed second in Domestic Extemp, which allowed them to compete at the State Debate Tournament in Aberdeen. Jeanelle was in the Extemp finals at State, and Tim and Brett competed through the fourth round. At East River Student Congress in Brookings, Heather was elected as presiding officer. 


#### FFA: Not Just Farming

## **BOYS CROSS-COUNTRY CAPTURES 4TH**







Having to continually compete against these odds our girls do very well. What they lack in ability they make up for in sportsmanship and spirit.





## BASKETBALL TEAM WINS FINAL GAME










#### TENNIS TEAM PROVES HIGHLY COMPETITIVE




Academically, students were also recognized. Over a dozen students were selected as delegates to attend Boy's and Girl's State. Brett Carlson was chosen to spend several weeks in Japan and Richard Westall was chosen as a National Merit Finalist. Madison's Olympic of the Mind team competed in the national tournament in Flagstaff, Arizona and several seniors received thousands of dollars in scholarships to their respective colleges.











On the national level, reflections were cast on the crew of the Challenger space shuttle. Christie McAuliffe, a teacher, was one of the seven astronauts killed in the mission. Celebrities came together to help the unfortunate during a 12hour concert. Live Aid was broadcast to millions of people around the world and profits were used to feed the starving. Terrorism reached a climax when President Ronald Reagan ordered the bombing of Tripoli, Libya, home of Momar El Ghadafi a supporter of anti-American terrorism. Disaster also loomed in the Soviet Union as a leak was discovered at a nuclear plant in Chernobyl. The fatality rate was an unofficial twenty-three.
