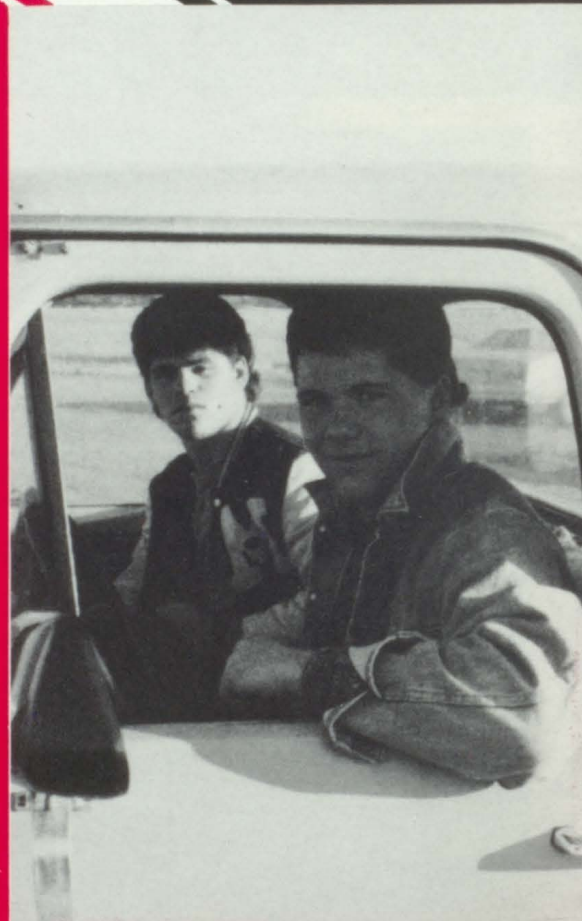
Bulldogs Are a Part of It!

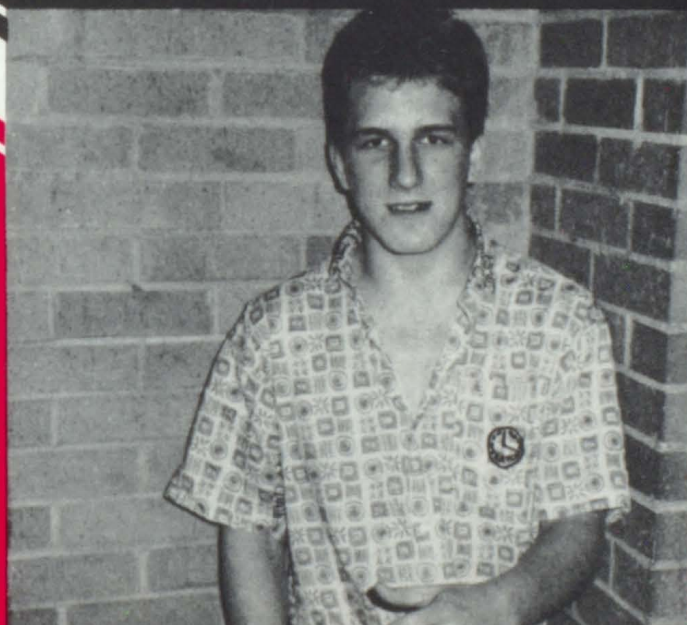

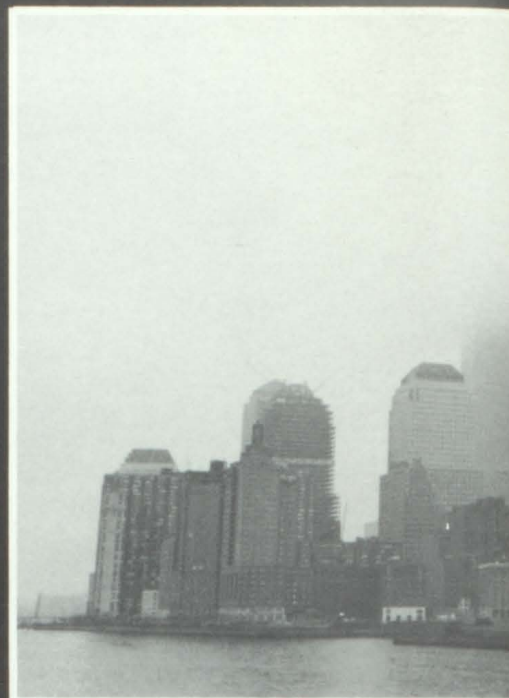

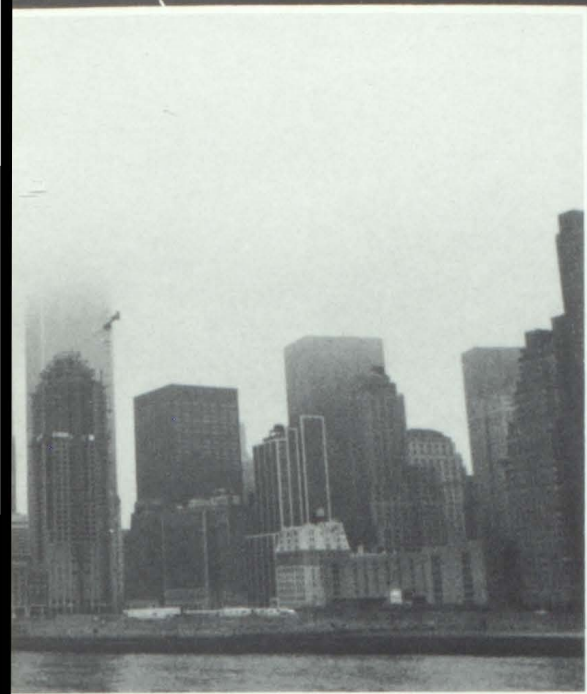
Students Participate In More Than School

Homecoming Is A Class Act.

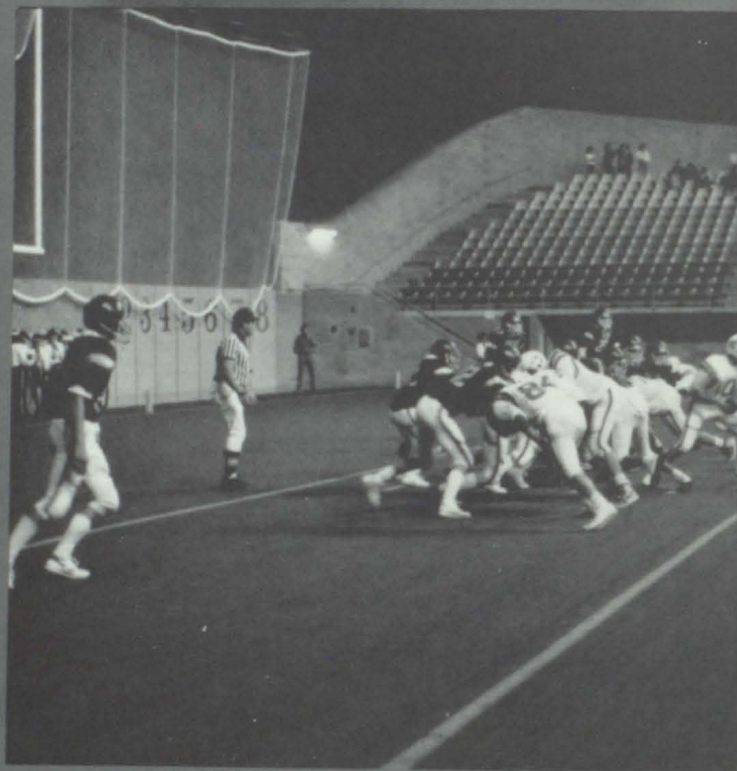
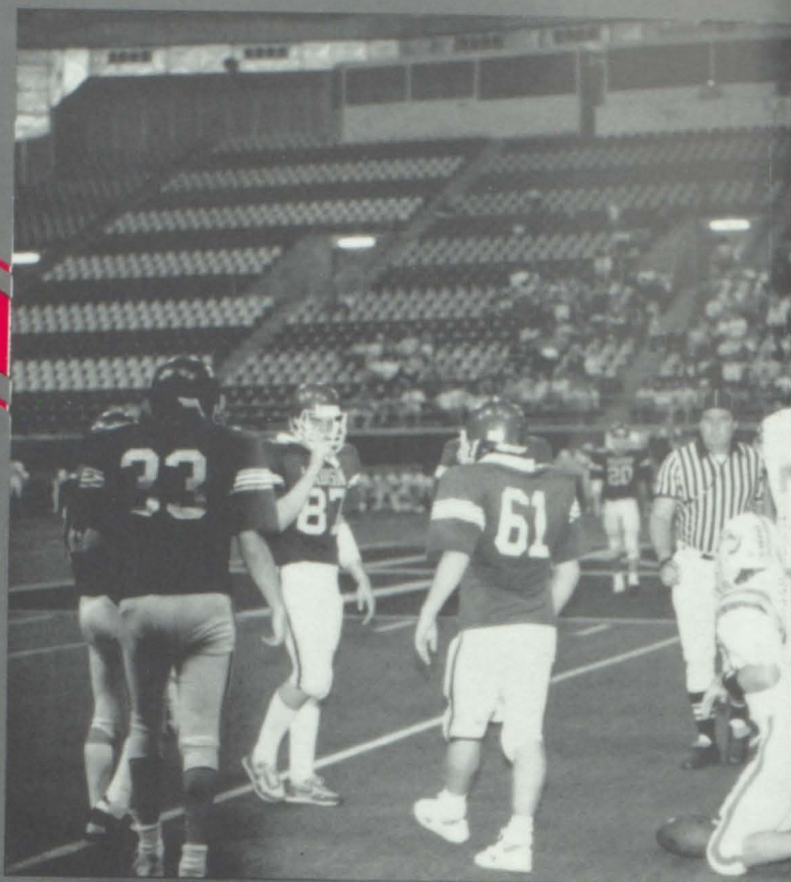
Homecoming week started on Monday, September 15, with Backwards and Switch Day. Students were asked to either dress with their clothing backwards or as a member of the opposite sex.

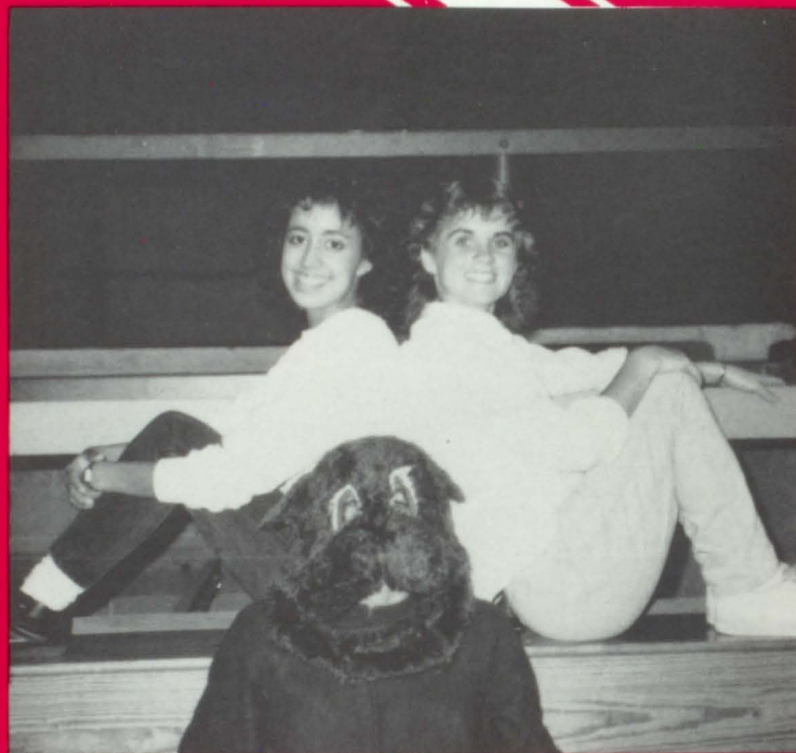
Cordts, Maxwell Crowned Queen and King

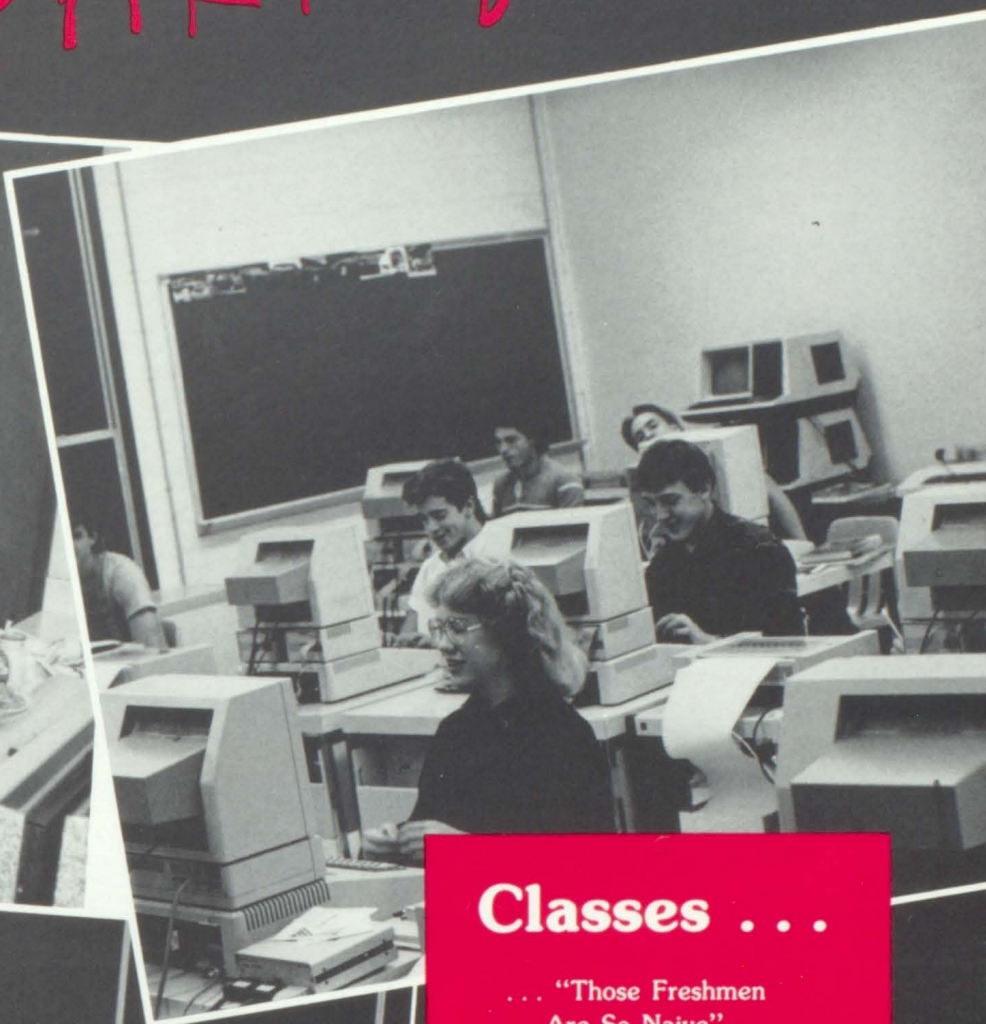

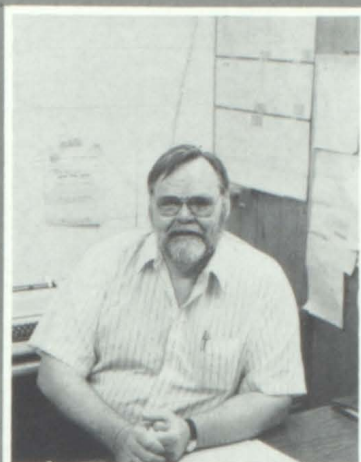
Computer classes are becoming more and more useful as students come to realize their importance in everyday life and future careers. Jeff St.Clair aids students in writing programs on various software.

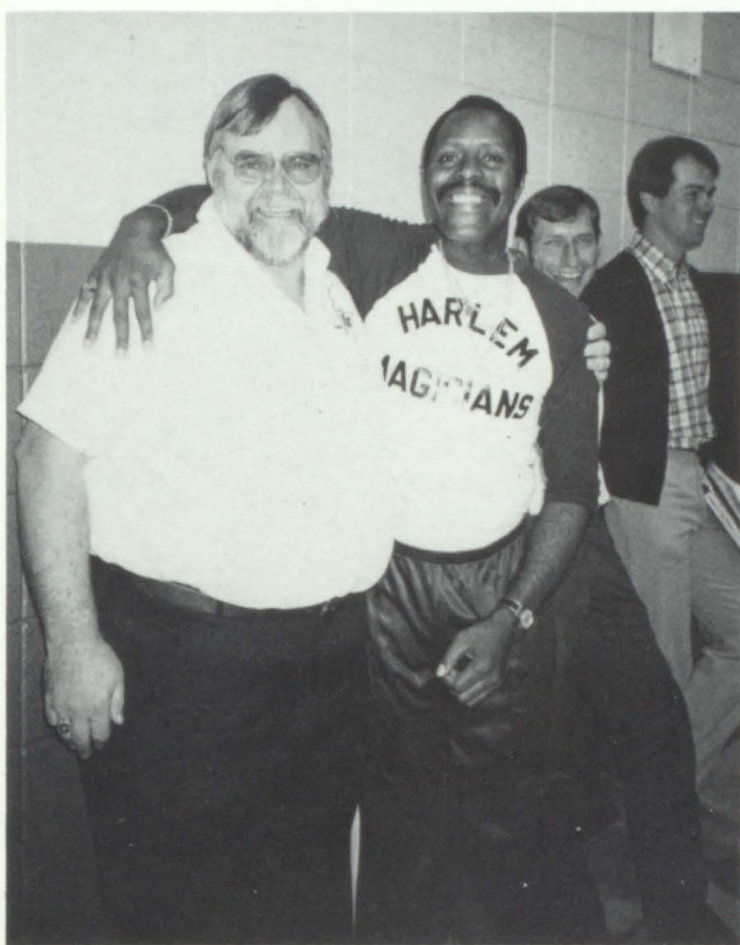

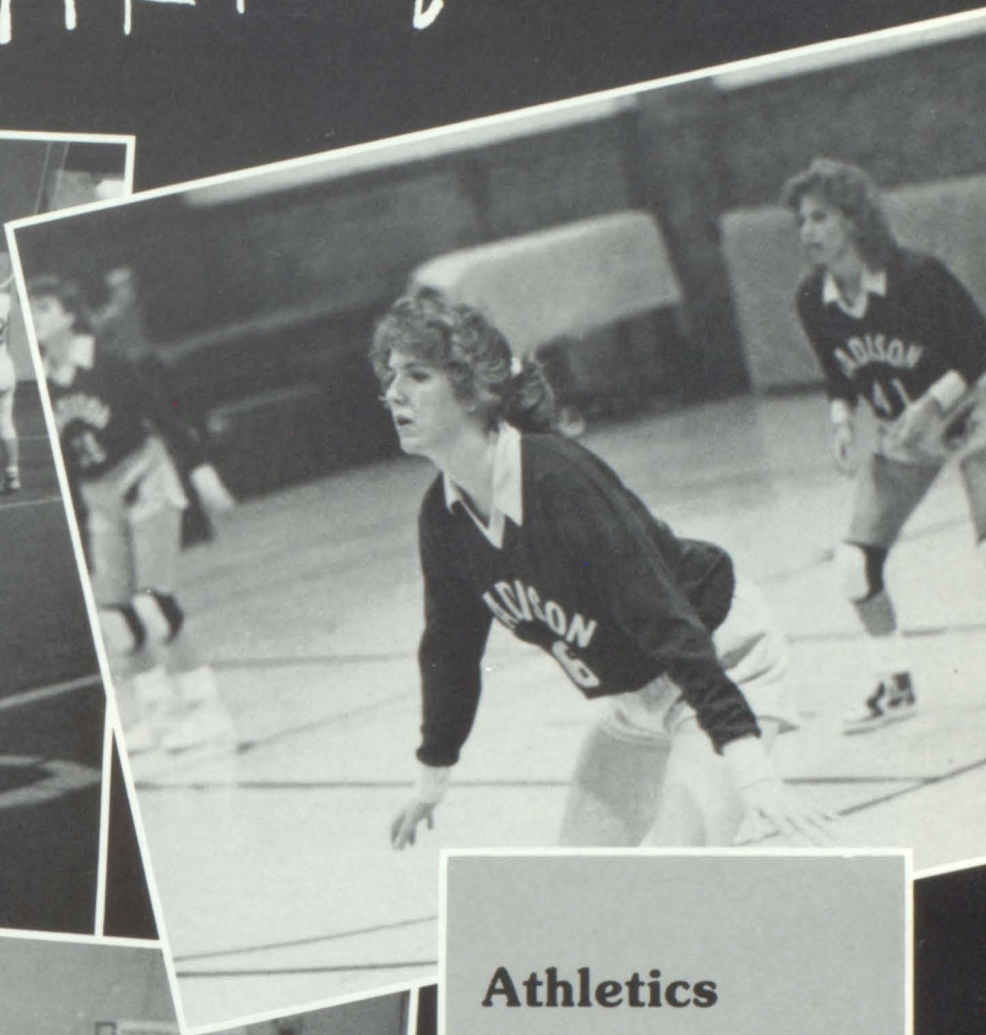
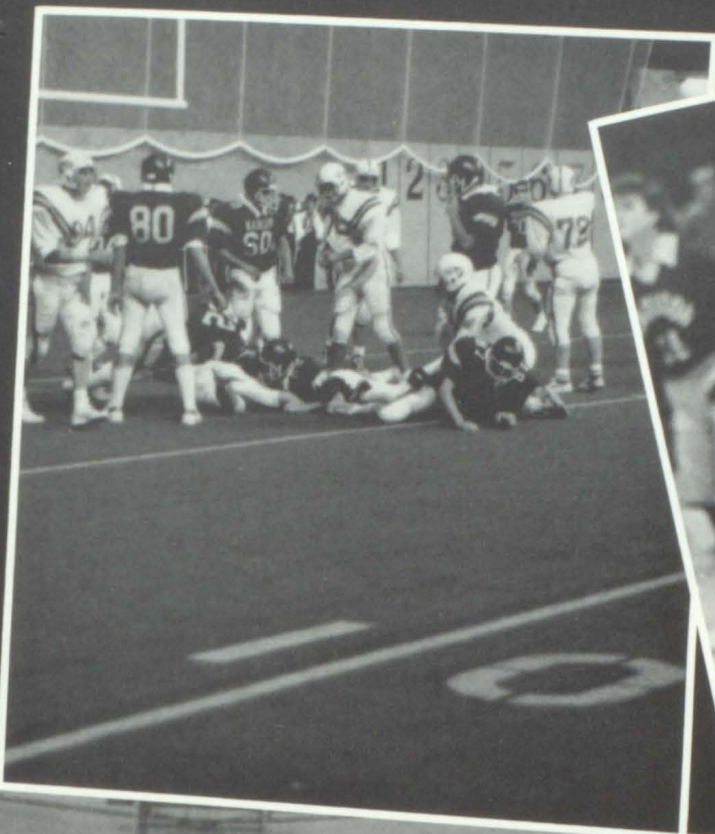

Gearing up for the upcoming season meant preparing to play in the Big Eight Conference. This was the first year for Madison in the conference and proved to be a hectic one.

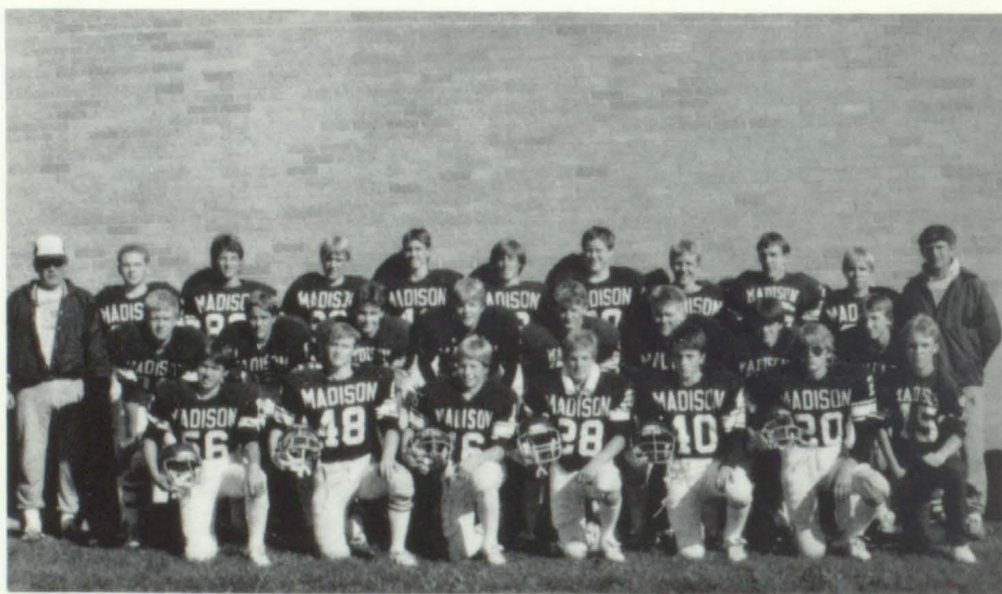

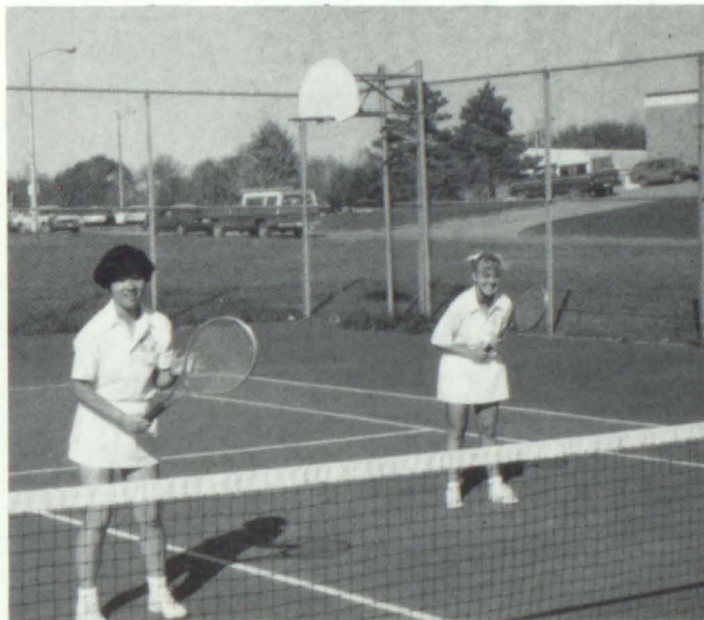

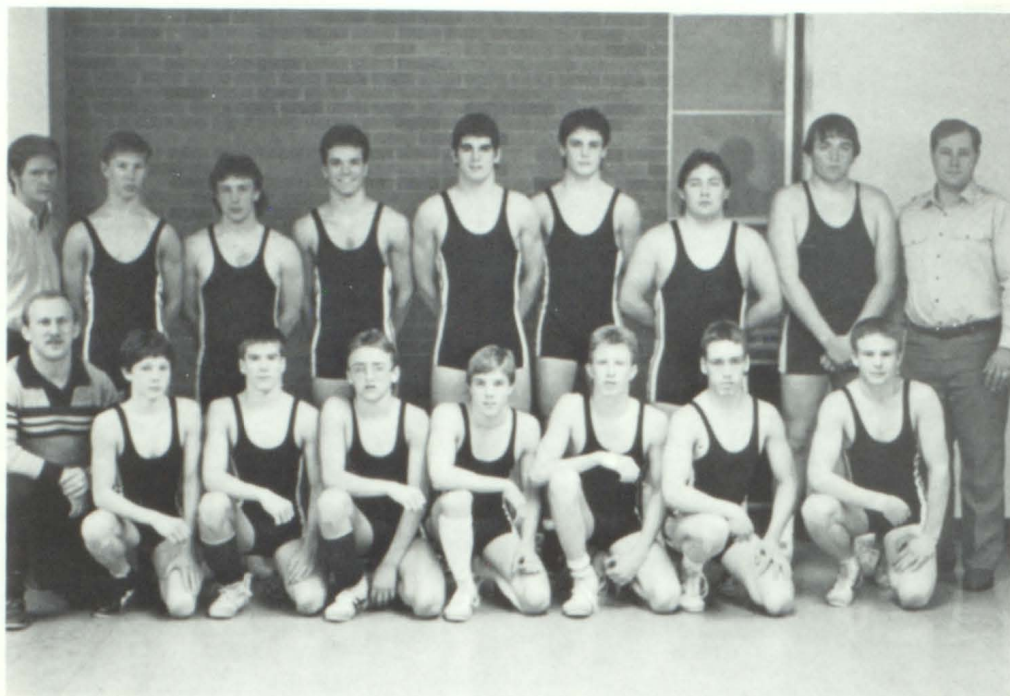

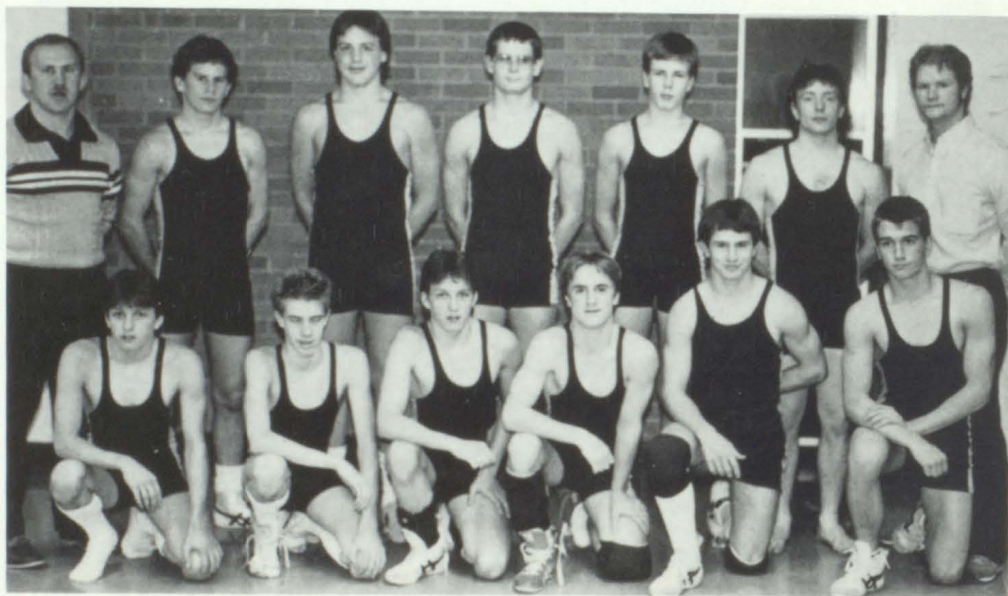
Bulldogs Show Great Pride

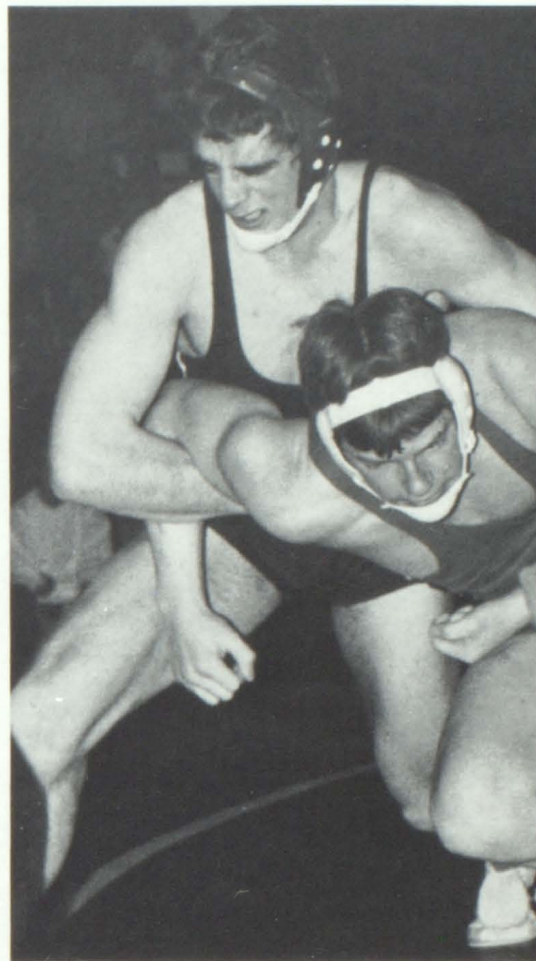

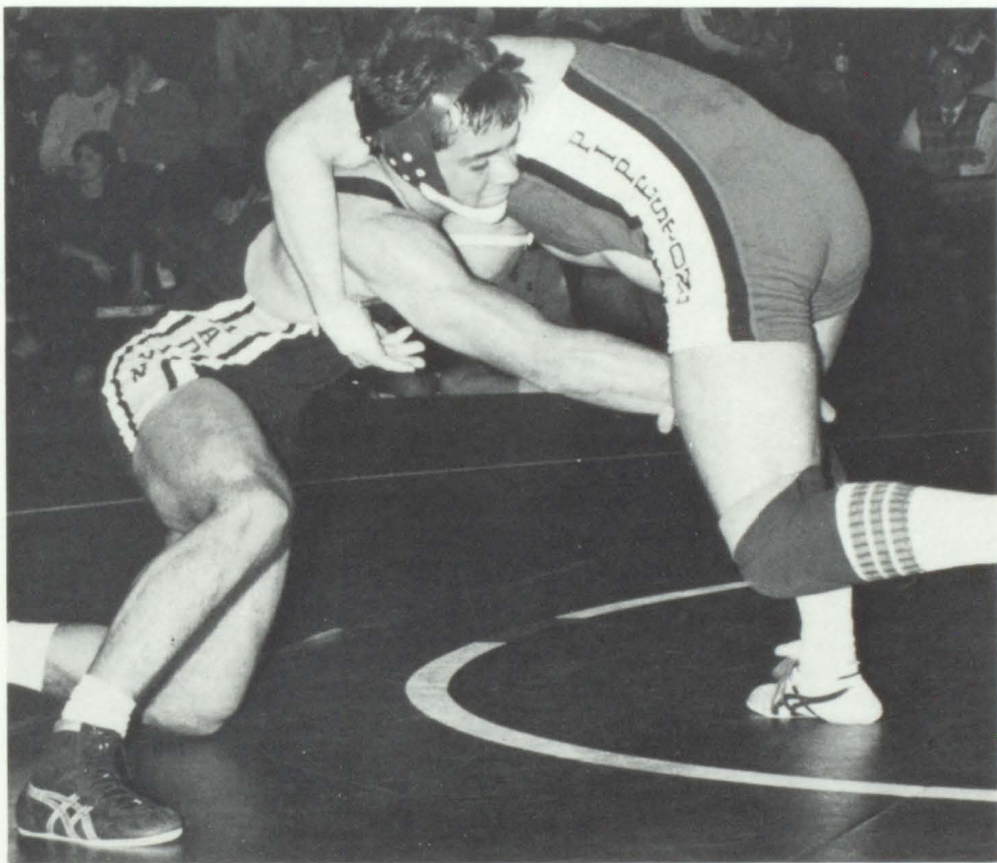

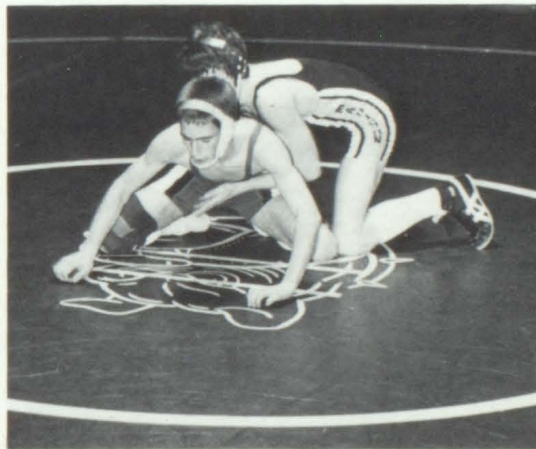

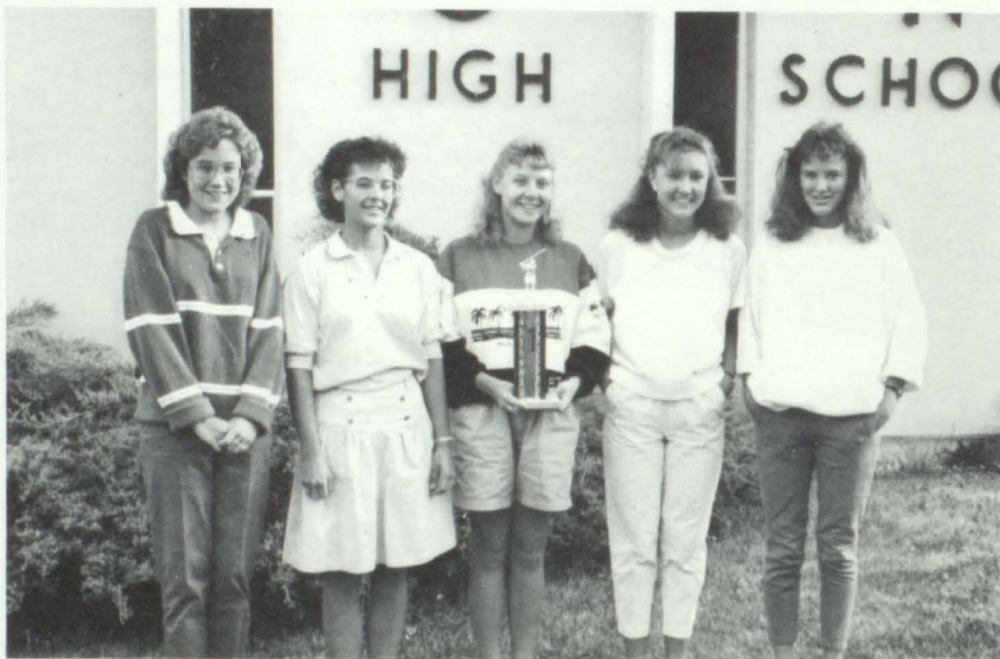

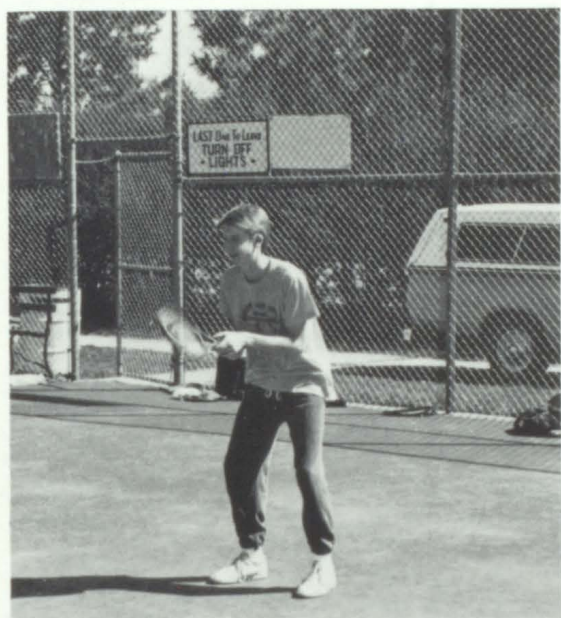

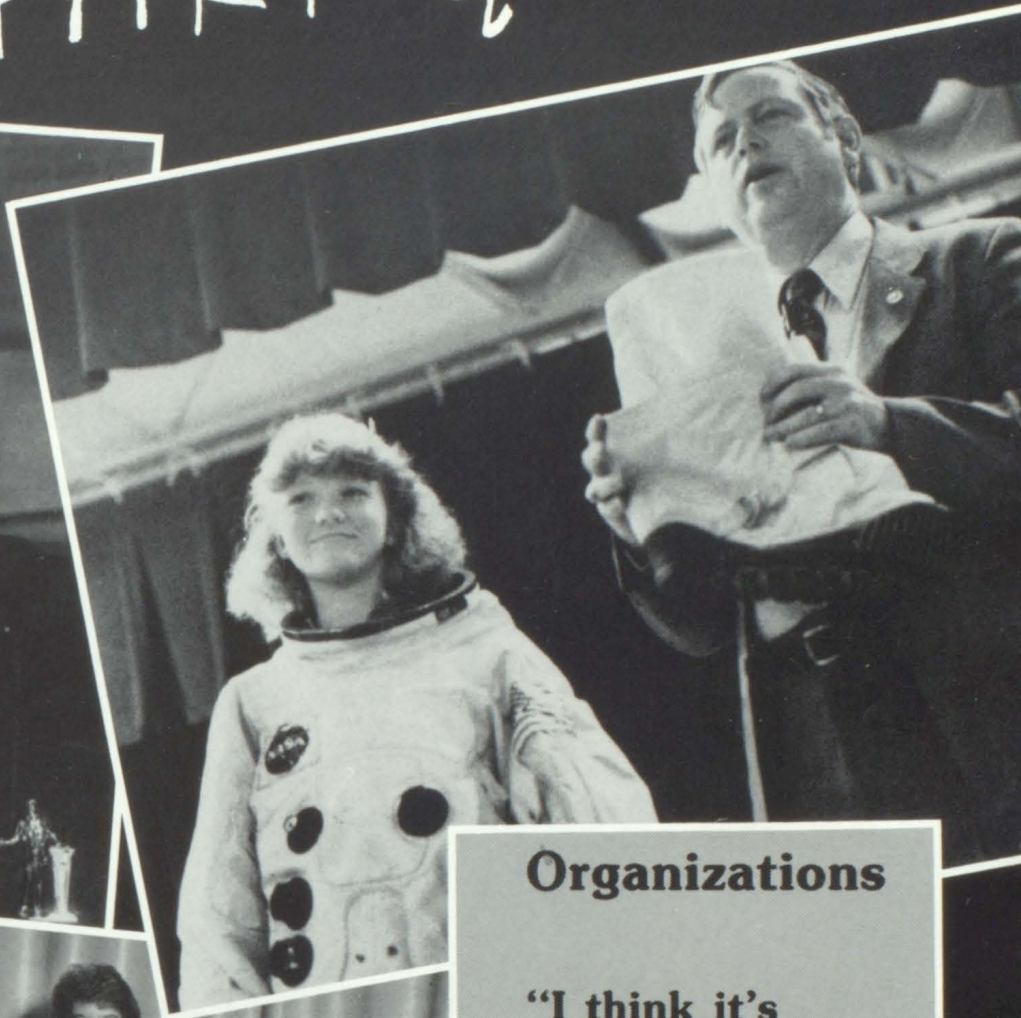

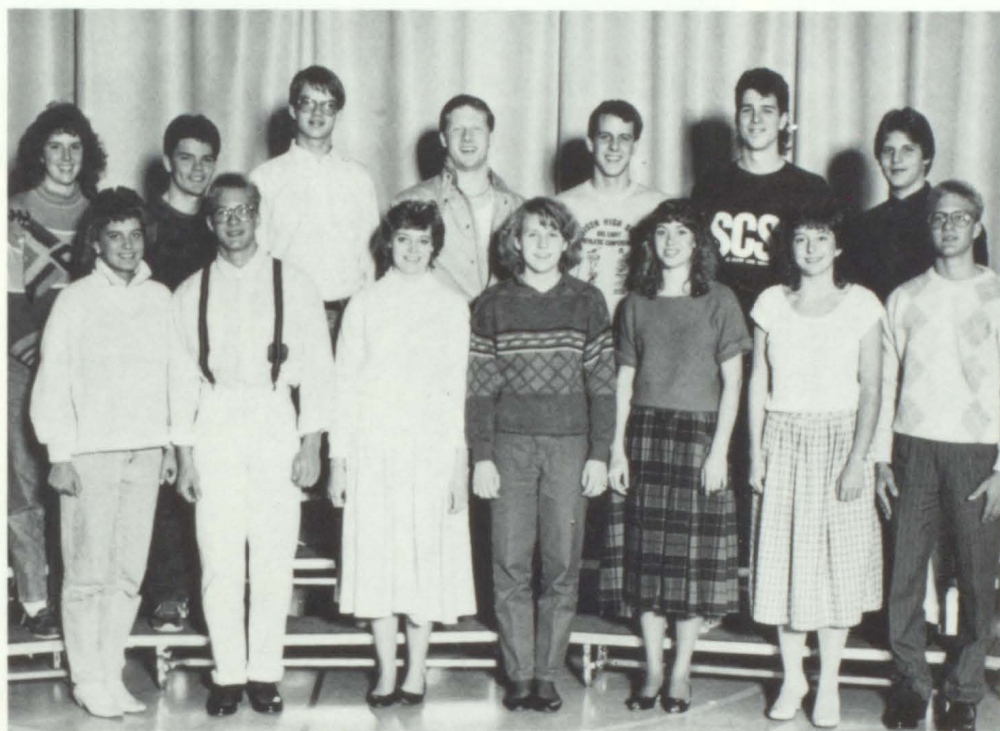

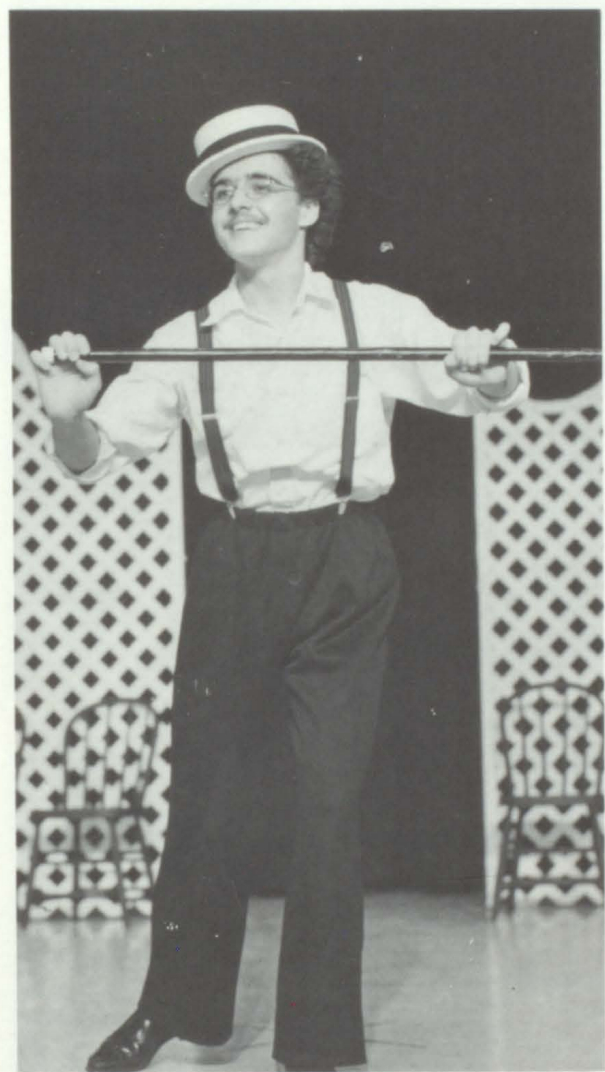

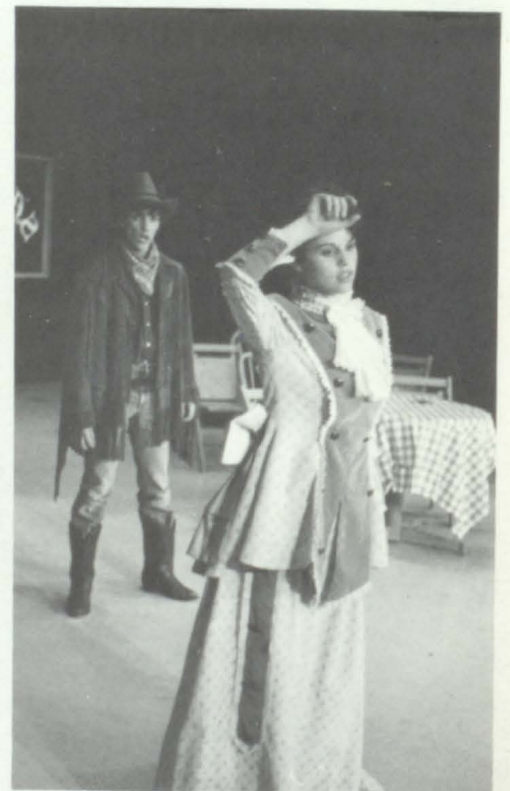

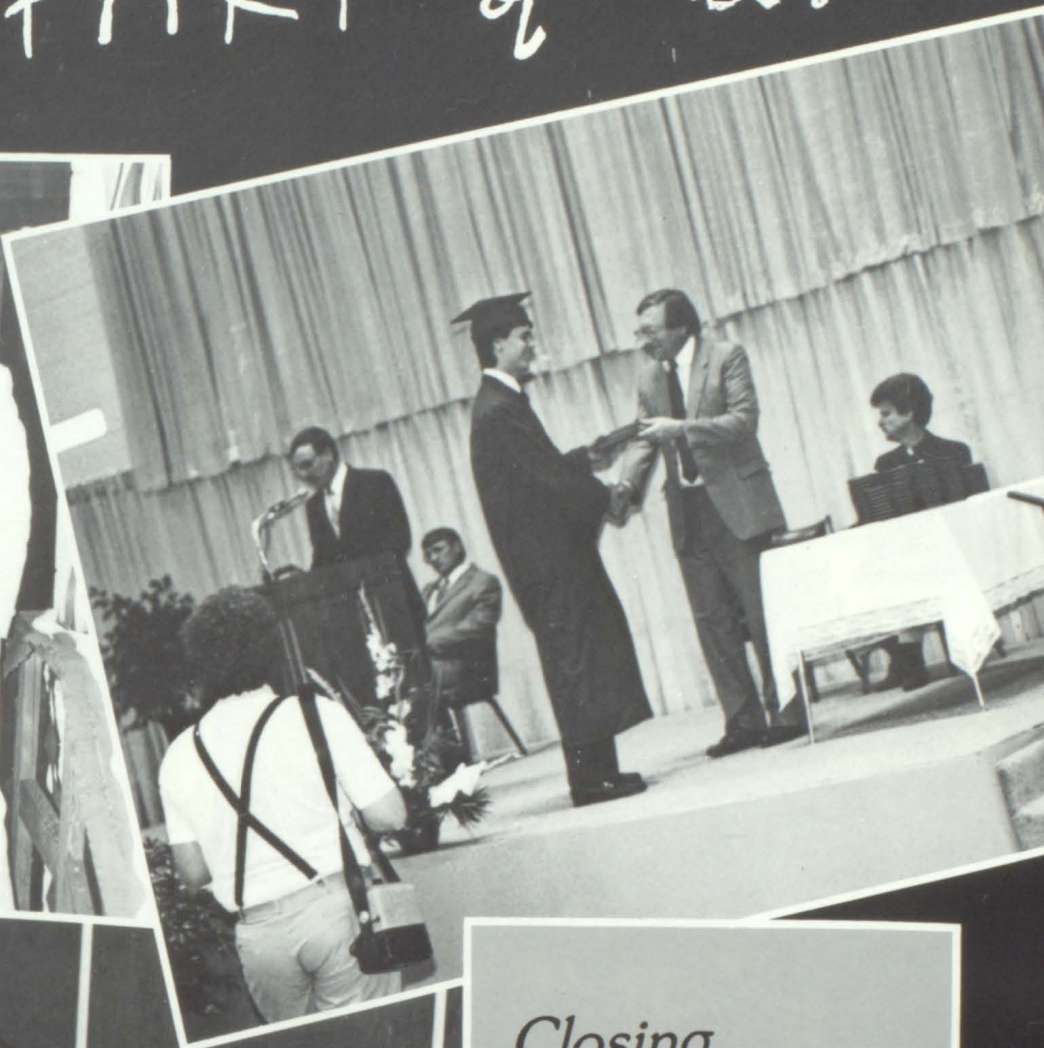

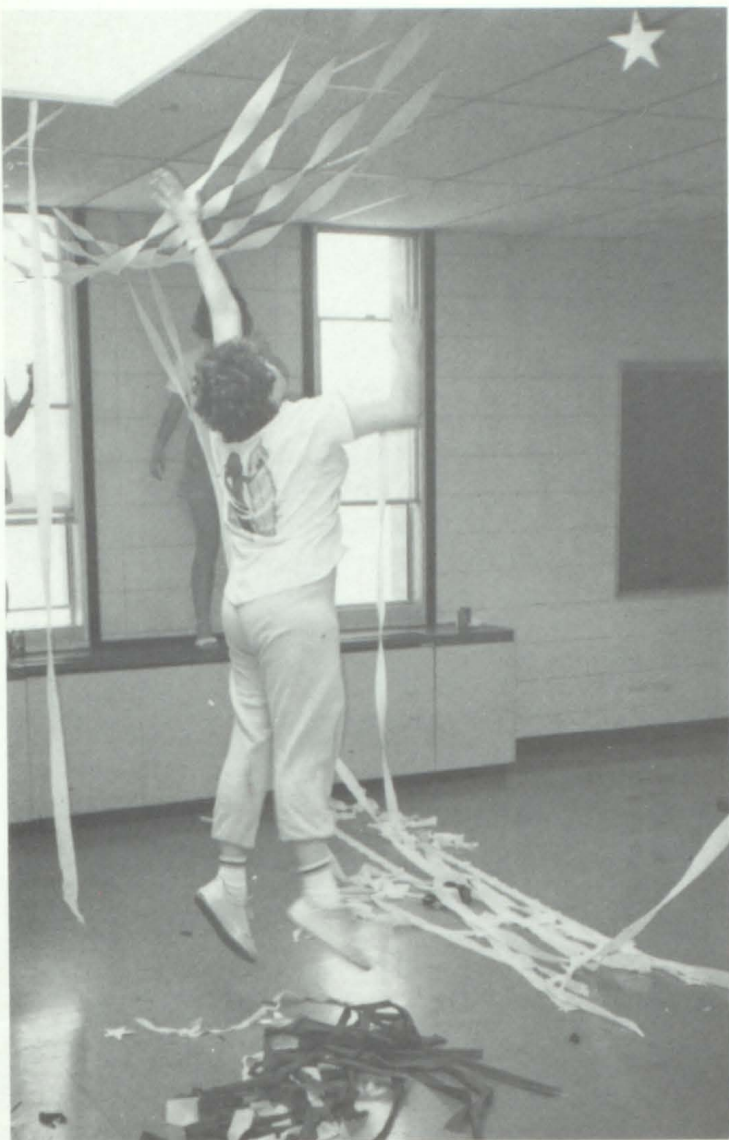
PROM NIGHT

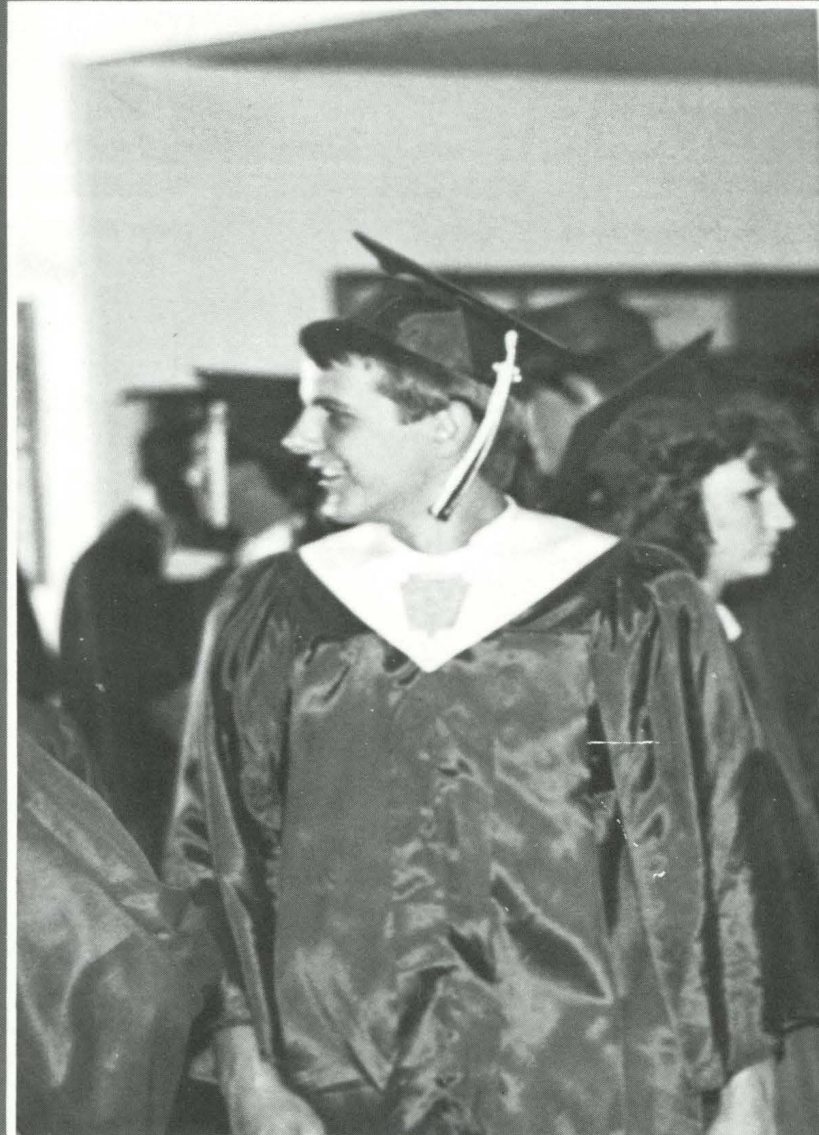
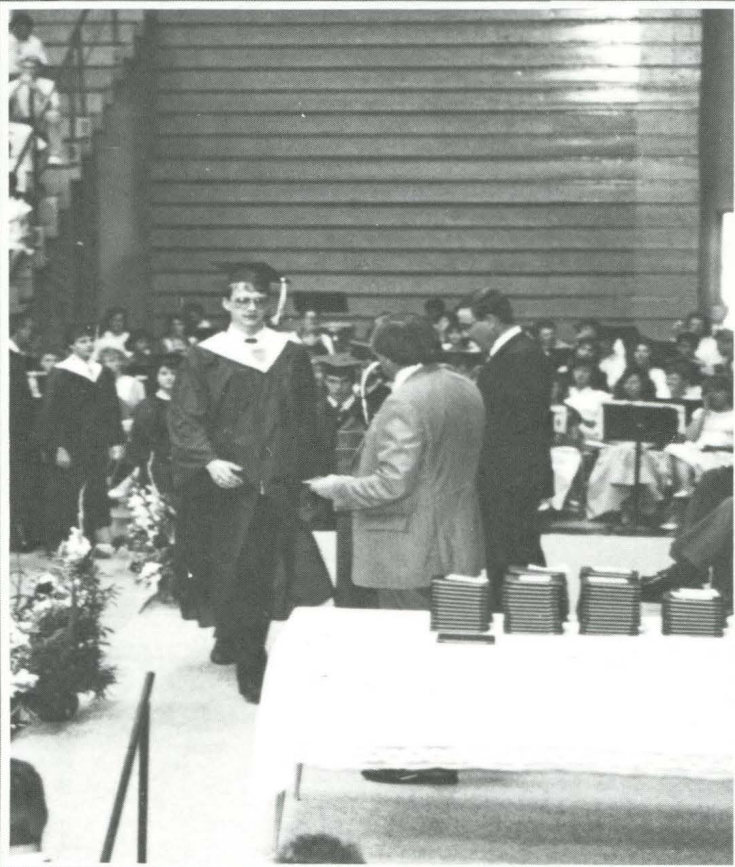

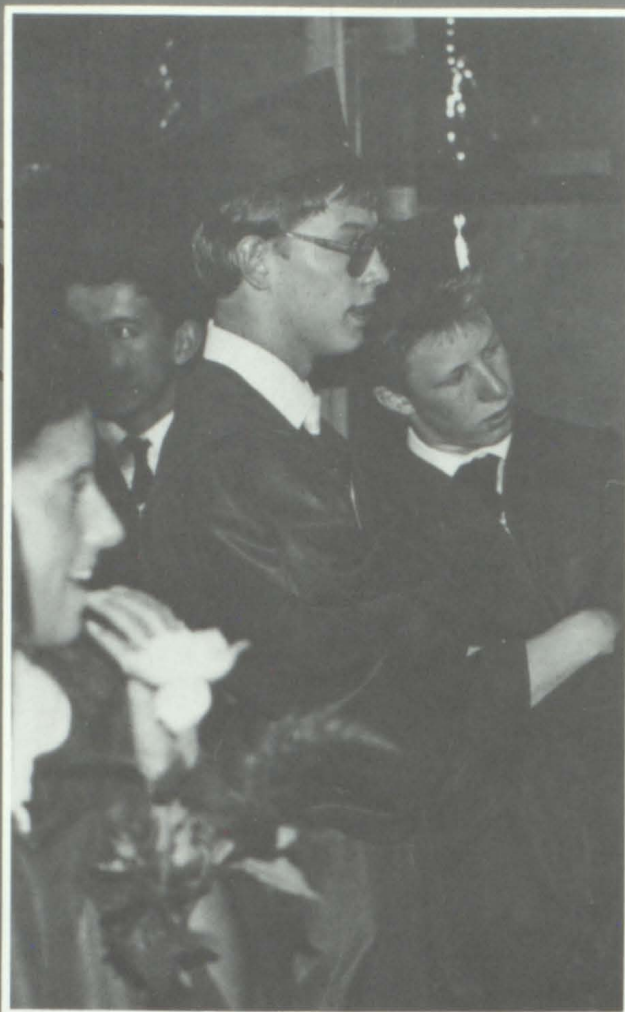

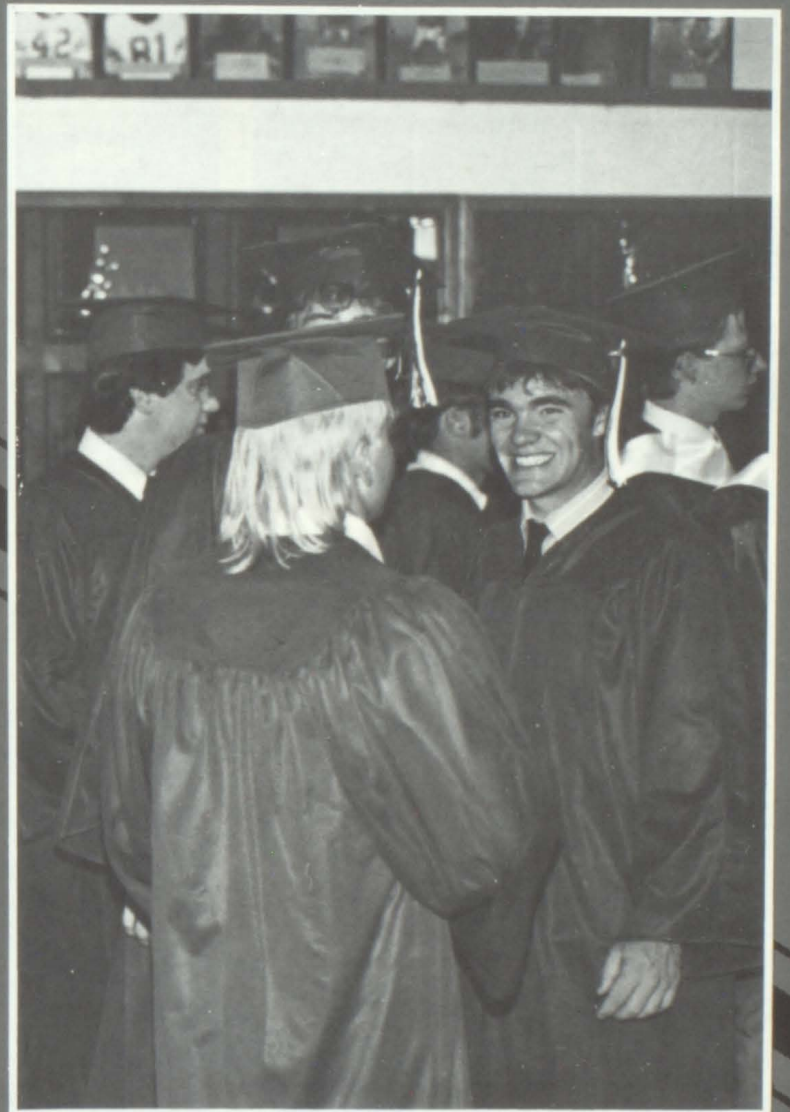

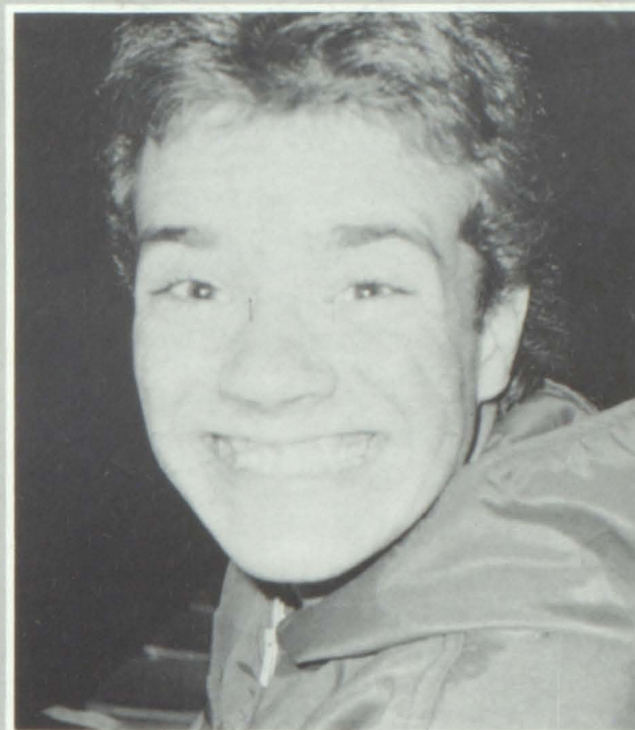
