Following the talent show Paula Gruenhagen and John Mathison were crowned 1987 Homecoming King and Queen.


Wednesday was declared, "Back to the Beach Day", with students dressing in various leisure beach attire.



At Hawks Well was selected as the One Act Play to be presented by the MHS Drama Department. This drama, written by William Butler Yeates, portrays events in the early history of Cuchulain, which foreshadow his later career. It depicts the futility of the hero's quest. Paralyzed by the dance of the hawk-like Guardian of the Well, he succumbs to the lure of eroticism and loses sight of his mission. Cuchulain is responsible for his own failure; the pursuit of his dream leads only to subsequent pain and destruction. The play is dominated throughout by a sense of defeat and disillusion. The old man, exhausted by the quest for immortality, points to the vanity of life, while the young and bold-hearted Cuchulain represents man's striving for spiritual transformation. The climax of the action lies not in words but in the dance, with the commentary provided by the final words of the dancers.

The Madison Cast earned one of six supe-

rior awards that were given in state competition. Cory Heidelberger earned a superior award in the male lead category with his portrayal of the Old Man. Andy Cook earned an excellent in the male support role, and Nicloe Petersen, Meredith Schlisner, Darci Bowman, and Michelle Glanzer earned superior awards in the Ensemble Category. The technical crew received medals for their excellent cast support.









NFL

The National Forensic League is a national organization, the official purpose of which is "to promote the interests of interscholastic debate, oratory and public speaking by encouraging spirit of fellowship and by conferring a worthy badge of distinction." Senator Karl E. Mundt of MADISON is one of the founders of the NFL, and Madison High School is one of the earliest chapters.

To gain membership in the NFL, students must earn points by competing in oral interp, original oratory, extemp, team debate, Lincoln-Douglas debate or Student Congress. As the points—which are based on the member's ranking in a round of competition—accumulate, the NFL member earns a series of degrees. The first degree the "Degree of Merit" requires 25 points. The highest degree a student may earn is the Double Ruby, which requires 500 points—half of which must be earned in debate and half of which must be earned in individual events or service points. To earn the Double Ruby in the National Forensic League is an honor. Current Double Ruby members at MHS are: Heather Means, Monica Nelson, Michael Paulukonis, and Martin Nussbaum.

FHA






DEBATE

The MHS Debate season begins the first week-end in November and culminates with State Student Congress in April. During that season there are many types of events in which a student may compete. The most familiar and popular is team debate, an event which pits a team of two affirmative speakers against two negative speakers in a structured debate format. All debaters in the United States argue the same resolution during the school year. The 1987-88 topic was "Resolved: the United States Government should adopt a policy to increase political stability in Latin America." Another event held during the debate season is Lincoln-Douglas Debate. In "L-D Debate" a single affirmative and negative speaker argue a value-oriented question, such as "Resolved: There is no such thing as a just war". There are also three individual events in which students may choose to compete at any debate tournament. The first of these oral interp, which often appeals to students with a "dramatic flair". Interpers read and interpret humorous or serious works of literature. Another individual event is original oratory. Orators, who are often the best writers and most persuasive speakers, write and memorize an eight to ten minute speech, usually on a current social problem. Extemporaneous speaking, the third individual event, features speakers who think quickly and analytically. Extempers draw three current events—questions, select one, and prepare a 6-8 minute speech during a 30-45 minute preparation period. Each debate tournament holds competition in all events, frequently sub-dividing each event into levels of experience from novice to varsity. Students frequently compete in at least one individual event as well as debate at each tournament. This year's squad had a very successful year, winning trophies and awards in all events throughout the season.






