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





Faces of Change

Nothing seemed to embody the 1992-93 school year at MHS better than change. When we chose the theme in October, we had no idea how apt it would seem by June. Perhaps the first clue we had was that, in the course of choosing a theme, we changed our minds at least fifteen times. It seemed that, once again, the only constant was change.

First, President Clinton won a plurality of the popular vote and a sweeping majority of the electoral college with campaign cries of "It's time for a change!" Then the South Dakota Senate came under Democratic control for the first time in over a decade. With the aftershocks of the dissolution of the USSR, the face of Europe was changing faster than map- and foreign policymakers could handle. The face of politics changed.

Things were changing in Madison, too. The old junior high school, built as a senior high in 1914, completed its last year as an educational facility, and the grade schools "graduated" their last crop of sixth-graders. A Subway restaurant opened at a lucrative loca-

tion near the high school, and Spies Supervalue became Jubilee Foods. The face of our community changed.

Maybe most of all, MHS was changing. Some of the changes were obvious — who could miss the construction crew on the roof? — while others, like staff changes (including a new superintendent), a few new potholes, changes in the curriculum, and new senior privileges were more subtle. As always, there was a wide range of new activities starting and older ones ending. There also seemed to be a new school spirit which urged on nearly every sport, activity and organization to a better-than-average season. The face of MHS changed.

Finally, there were the tiny, constant changes in the student body itself. Our attitudes shifted throughout the year, influenced by local, state and national events. New students and friends (including the requisite hundred new frosh) joined us, old friends left, and all of us, little by little, grew up.

Our faces, too, were changing.









In the summer, I had to have six weeks of radiation. I slept all the time and hardly ate a thing until school started.

When I went back to school, I was still feeling the effects of the radiation. I missed a lot of school, but I still got caught up.


It made me really mad when people felt sorry for me. I did enough of that and it doesn't help anyone.

I want people to know not to treat someone who is different or weird like you're scared of them. It makes you feel alone and can hurt someone's feelings. All most people want is to be treated like normal, equal people because that's what they really are.

I have had a few good friends through this, and they know I'm the same person as I always was.
















Facing FACTS

It's Not Fair!


In response to an English assignment on the subject of fairness, freshmen voiced their opinions. Following is Robbie Hein's:




Tutoring







Adopt A Grandparent "Old People Need Love Too!"






BAD TO THE BONE!




Seven to State












Faces of CHALLENGE




Why Do We Do It?











This all changed in 1969 when the organization decided that men and women have equal opportunities.


Since then, the number of females enrolled in FFA has increased considerably.


Cotton Patch Gospel



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
Facing the Future
