






And the sign says...








TERROR IN THE HEARTLAND

It was 9:00 a.m. on April 19, 1995. Almost everyone in the midwest was just doing their own thing, even the people in the federal building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. No one knew that in just three short minutes, 168 people; including men, women, and even children; would soon become victims of what is now known as the Oklahoma bombing.

How bad was it? "Imagine taking an office and putting it in a blender and turning it on," said paramedic John Griffith.

"We've had tornadoes. We had a school blow up a few years ago. But I can tell you, we've never had anything like this. Not even close," said Rev. Dan Alexander, senior minister of Oklahoma City's First Christian Church.

The bombing shocked most people because of the number of children that were killed and injured. The bomb almost completely took out a second story day-care center. This has outraged our nation and lawmakers promise to do more to prevent this from ever happening again.

The explosion didn't just affect the people in Oklahoma City, it left many people wondering if it could happen where they live. Many people who work in federal buildings and other vital buildings are wondering, "Could it happen to us?"



One-Act Play receives 9th consecutive superior trophy for performance





the clutches of death.





Academic Excellence Pays Off



Thousands of high school seniors fill out scholarships every year and others try to get a high enough score on the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery test (ASVAB) to get a scholarship from the United States Armed Forces. If applying to a college, you would need to take the ACT or the SAT. Sometimes the scores you have depend upon what scholarships you can apply for.

What does it take to fill out a scholarship? Most scholarships require





The girl's golf season was hampered by a cold, wet spring. Practices and a few meets were canceled due to weather. However, the girls persisted and finally better weather came.

















LET'S PLAY WITH BLOCKS

Wouldn't it be great if you only had four classes a day? Well, the dream may come true. One idea discussed on teacher early release days has been a change to Block Scheduling. MHS staff are exploring a 4x4 block schedule meaning students would have four, 90 minute classes a day with ten minute breaks between each class. Students will then be able to complete a full year class in one semester and a semester class is a quarter. There is only one problem with Block Scheduling...NO STUDY HALL! What most students don't understand is that the juniors and seniors who don't have a class will have open campus.

When the we went to the staff and asked what they thought of Block Scheduling this is what we got. Mr. Winterton's remark, "There are some good points and bad points. Students would have the opportunity to take one

more class a semester than they do now. There would be a longer period of time without math and you could lose some skills." Mr. Hegg exclaimed, "If properly applied, it would be exceptionally good for the music department." Mr. Lorenz's comment was, "The concept has some merit, we just need to make sure that it won't interfere with anything our students are accomplishing right now."

When it comes right down to it, everyone has their own opinion about Block Scheduling. Whatever decision is made by the administration and staff, block scheduling will signal changes for everyone.

MODERNIZATION

Improvements Ahead

What is modernization? During a summer workshop for teachers, modernization was defined as any technique, teaching method, or idea which improves the classroom. It is different for each school district and each teacher.

During the summer of 1994, the Lake Central School District received a \$50,000 implementation grant from the South Dakota Modernization Office. This money is to be used to start working on what they call the four Rs. These are Relinking schools and

communities, Reaching student potential, Revitalizing instruction, and Reconciliation of cultural diversity.

Two Administrators and eight teachers attended a workshop in Mitchell and returned with new and interesting ideas for improvement in the Lake Central District. The staff took those ideas and came up with ideas of their own such as increasing use of technology in subject areas, integrated units such as math and science, block scheduling, and early release time for teachers to work on

more school improvement ideas.

When students were asked what modernization was, they said early release. Modernization means more to teachers than students and as modernization site director, Suzanna McGee said, "Change is never easy and this will be a challenging time for everyone, but our partnership between parents, students, educators, and the community will help facilitate our goals."






newspaper, few are willing to be active staff members." says Mr. Norm Johnson, the Maroon Adviser.







New Freshmen traditions are begun, while other traditions stay the same





We have fallen in love for the first time.


We have been honored with awards and scholarships.

We have won State Championships.


And we have graduated from Madison High School.
