# Enter the Drug Dogs 

Drug Awareness increases in Madison

Studies have found that drug use among high school students has increased over the past five years. In an effort to determine just how bad the drug problem was in South Dakota, Governor Janklow purchased several dogs trained to detect the presence of drugs with the intent of sending them to the state's high schools.

In January, the drug dogs came to MHS for the first time. The dogs alerted officers to several lockers in the both the middle school and high school. The lockers were searched but no actual drugs were found. The owners of the lockers were questioned by counselors and
parents were contacted. The school year progressed with few incidents or signs of unrest. But, on Tuesday, May 14 , the library aide, having witnessed suspicious behavior on the part of two students, exited the library and looked through the window to get a better view. She witnessed a drug deal going on.

The two 17 year-old males were taken into police custody. One was charged with criminal possession and distribution of cocaine and the other was charged with possession only. There is potential for severe penalties for both individuals; a federal law mandates the
doubling of any sentence handed down for a drug offense committed on school property. On May 23 the drug dogs returned. The events of that day may or may not have been altered by the total locker clean out which took place the day before. Nothing was found during this search except alcohol in a student's car.

Did Governor Janklow discover anything? Is the general public more informed now than it was before? Maybe. However, the students know that there is, has been, and probably will always be a drug problem in high school.

In what is perhaps the most tragic song ever written, Don McLean's "American Pie," McLean tries to describe to us what the world would be like without music:

And in the streets the children screamed

The lovers cried and the poets dreamed

But not a word was spoken

The church bells all were broken...

Yes, a world without music (or any art form, for that matter) would be dull, indeed. But why? Where does their meaning and necessity lie in our society, and especially, MHS?

There no longer exists in this culture the high school student who owns more poetry collections than compact discs. The culture has shifted over the span of the late twentieth century from the likes of Twain, Emerson, folk music, and polka to a wondrous musical
renaissance with almost too much variety to choose from. One needs to look no further than the varied tastes and personalities of MHS students to see the youth of today's passion for this influential art. Why the shift? Quite simply, it may be the youth of today's unquenchable need to express, release, and internalize emotion, to somehow project out the fear, stress, love, and faith fed to them mercilessly by a world running down. The frontier days are long behind us. In its place is a world that seems to be stacked against the teenager: pro-entropy agents such as endless propaganda, peer pressure, the prospect of entering and affording college, expanding technology, changing values, and other forseeable crises of the future that this generation has been nonverbally designated to take on. In a typical day, high school students contend with an infintite spectrum of emotions; they may encounter them all before their day is done. During a typical day, the average student will likely be
faced with emotions such as stress, disappointment, rage, worry, anxiety, rejection, failure, exhaustion, envy, lust, pride, love, victory, happiness, and bliss. Consequently, something is desired that strikes the same emotional chord that ails or uplifts them - that in itself is art: description of an otherwise indescribable emotion.
"Without music I would be dead. Either that or deported or in jail, or something," said Curtis Beesley, who plays bass guitar for a promising rock band. "It's saved me. Without it, I might start killing again."

During the school year, the junior class at MHS took a mini-survey in which they were asked questions pertaining to their favorite music, the significance of the music and lyrics, and how long this music would last. The responses, not surprisingly, were often vigorously positive or negative toward certain genres:

Lucas Lembcke, for instance, stated that "Country
is the only kind of music; everything else is just a bunch of loud noise."

Nearly every musical category was named as a favorite by one student or another - everything from Mozart and Bach to Eddie Vedder and Jim Morrison.

But perhaps the most striking result of the surveys was the wildly growing popularity of alternative rock. The popular bands of today have penetrated deep into the public consciousness; lead singers have become poetic icons. Pearl Jam entertains a worldwide public with its quirky alternative encyclopedias, Nine Inch Nails reduce nihilism to its pep-rally aesthetic, Live's highly agitated brand of spiritual rock has its passionate followers, and the mythical enigma of Kurt Cobain and Nirvana still sells an absurd amount of records.

Yet in the end each and every student has his own music, and his opinion should be respected by all, for only he knows what it means.

## Future Problem Solvers Heads to International Competition

It happens every third Saturday in April, in an auditorium on the campus of Augustana College in Sioux Falls, at around eight-thirty in the evening. The people in the auditorium, all residents of different cities from around the state clustered into their respective groups, are tense. The award could go to any one of the top ten South Dakota Future Problem Solving teams that qualified for state competition. Placing second was the Madison, team composed of Molly Eastman, Shane Heilman, Brian Jerke, and Michael Reese.

The team will compete at the International Competition in Providence, Rhode Island this summer after a one-year hiatus, thanks
to the international judges, who ranked the written portion of their competition as worthy of a wild-card bid amongst all other secondplace entries in the world. Not only was the team honored for written competition, but their Skit Presentation also won first place (and a standing ovation), and Shane Heilman placed second individually.
"We are the best team in the world," said Michael Reese in a humble tone.
"We're pretty good," said Shane Heilman.

The team's skit they considered their best ever. The state problem was Cybernetics, and the team focused on the unnecessary length of time it would take the government to employ its

## Us vs. the World

MHS's Extension program involves the following activities (in no particular order): Future Problem Solving, Odyssey of the Mind, Knowledge Masters Open, and the American High School Mathematics Examination. In each of these competitions Madison's best and brightest students are put to an ultimate test - a battle of wit and cunning - against the best minds that the rest of the state of South Dakota has to offer.

As usual, MHS was more than up to the challenge.

Once again the central core of the student body's intellectual prowess was able to put their heads together and dominate the statewide scene. Madison's Future Problem Solving Team collected even more trophies than in previous years during State Competition in April, earning first place in Skit Presentation (out of the ten best state qualifying schools) and second place (by a very narrow margin) in team bookletcompetition, good enough for a wild-card bid to International Competition in

Providence, Rhode Island in June. Shane Heilman earned second place individually.

The nineteen MHS students involved in KMO turned in two brilliant performances, compiling two consecutive second-place finishes in the state out of sixteen schools.

This year's Odyssey of the Mind team chose the problem "Classics...Great Impressions." For their problem they were to make reproductions of a famous painting and poem, make up their own, and create a skit
around these. They started preparing in December by brainstorming, designing and constructing scenery, writing the script, and practicing spontaneous problems. The skit revolved around a girl's recurring dream of an art museum, and her seeking help to understand the dream.

The team placed second at regional competition in Madison before traveling to state competition in Pierre, where the results were unavailable to the general public.
